
#### ARCADIA KINDERGARTEN SCREENING 2021

Kindergarten screening for **Arcadia Local School** will take place on <u>Friday, March 5, 2021</u>. If you have a child or know of someone who is a resident of Arcadia School District, and will be five on or before August 1, 2021 and plan to attend kindergarten during the 2021-2022 school year they should contact the school **at 419-894-6431 ext. 300**, starting **NOW for a screening appointment.** 

The child <u>MUST</u> live in Arcadia School District to be screened. Open enrolled students are screened in their home school district.

It will be necessary for parents to bring a copy of the child's birth certificate, immunization records, proof of residency and court ordered custody papers (if applicable) to the screening.

State requirements for immunization are: 5/DTaP; 4/Polio; 2/MMR (Measles, Rubella, Mumps), 3/Hepatitis B Vaccine, and 2/Varicella before entering kindergarten in 2021-2022.

#### From Bruce Kidder, Superintendent

I would like to start out by thanking the staff, students and parents for all their support and patience during these challenging times. We are back to a normal schedule of 5 day in-person instruction for families that want their students to receive direct instruction and support services. I encourage all families with students completing on-line classes to consider having them return the last 9 weeks so that they can adjust back to in-person instruction. The district and staff have worked very hard to provide a safe learning environment and I believe that except in rare situations all students would benefit from in-person instruction.

Construction is almost completed on the parking lot. Several items will be finished this spring and they are installing privacy fencing, installing fuel station fencing and replacing several small areas of concrete that do not drain properly. I am also planning on having a new greenhouse installed in the spring that will support the Ag and Science curriculums.

#### **PreK-12 Notification System**

Arcadia School will once again use the school-to-family communications service called PreK-12 Notification. We will use this service to deliver both emergency and nonemergency messages to you via telephone for 2020-2021

school year. Using PreK-12 Notification, we can quickly contact all families - in a matter of minutes - with urgent news such as school closings, early dismissals, delayed buses or rescheduled activities. We will also use the service to provide timely non-emergency information such as reminders about important meetings or special events at school that involve your children. In the case of school closings, this service is meant to be a compliment to the existing means of communications, TV stations, radio stations, etc. We will continue to utilize ALL of these mediums in the event of a school closure and/or delay.

Your primary phone number will be supplied to PreK - 12 Notification Service. Each family may add up to four telephone numbers. In an emergency the message will be delivered to all of your numbers.

Families that wish to include additional phone numbers may do so by calling the PreK-12 Notification Parent Hotline at 1-800-846-4976. For security reasons, you must call from your Primary phone number to manage your personal emergency contact list.

What is the Weather?

During the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, Mrs. Stoner's students completed a Science unit on Weather. Part of the unit was studying the tools used my meteorologists. The students learned about such tools as a rain

gauge, thermometer, satellites, and anemometers. The students also kept charts of three weeks of Ohio weather and looked at the weather patterns that occurred during those weeks. The picture shows the students holding their anemometers.

**Third grade** is the year that the students begin memorizing their multiplication facts. Rather than working out of a textbook every day the third graders get to participate in "Sports Week." Every year in third grade



we have a "Sports Week" where students get to practice their multiplication facts by playing games. They play basketball, baseball, hockey, tennis, and golf all while working on memorizing multiplication facts. Each day they get a "VIP Badge" to be added to their All-Access pass when they master their facts. These athletes and mathematicians had a BALL learning and playing! In Reading the third graders learned all about our solar system. We read several expository texts about Earth and its neighbors, learning about how everything orbits the sun and all of the planets have unique

characteristics. The students drew pictures of our solar system and also got to pick a planet to research and present to the rest of the class. Finally, we discussed the phases of the moon and why the moon seems to "disappear" on certain nights. We modeled the phases of the moon with Oreos to



show how the moon "waxes" and "wanes."

**Fourth grade** is glad to be back full time and in person. We had a great time singing songs that helped us learn our geometry concepts. One of the favorites is the song that taught us about parallel, intersecting and perpendicular lines:



We are preparing to work with fractions as we learn about factors and multiples, again another favorite song of theirs.

In science we have been learning about animal adaptations. They worked on slides and chose an animal that they researched and discussed three adaptations the animal has in order to survive, then had to take one of the adaptations away and figure ways the animal would have to survive without that adaptation. We finished the unit doing a reader's theater about animal adaptation.

Students are becoming experts in technology during this pandemic and will be able to adapt as they continue getting older.

#### 4th Grade!


The 4<sup>th</sup> graders have continued to show incredible growth this year in reading and writing. We have covered a multitude of genres in reading, and the students have shown they can carefully analyze and comprehend these texts. Additionally, the 4<sup>th</sup> graders are currently working on an informational essay that covers 3 texts! They have show great perseverance in analyzing the text, planning out their body paragraphs, editing, and typing their final drafts.



In social studies we completed our Native American Unit and students each created a shoebox diorama of a tribe that we covered in class. These turned out incredibly well and the presentations were very informative. Recently, we have been discussing the American Revolution War and its causes. Within this unit we have also learned about the Declaration of Independence, Articles of Confederation, and the Constitution. This 4<sup>th</sup> grade class has high critical thinking skills and think about the different perspectives of individuals who we cover in our state's and nation's history.

### 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Math and Science

The fifth graders have been hard at work learning how to add, subtract, multiply and divide decimals. The students have started adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators and they are learning how to find a common denominator by locating common multiples. While this has been challenging, the students have made great progress.



Many fifth graders have mastered their multiplication facts and are very close to mastering their division facts. While this may not seem like a huge feat to some, this is a necessary

skill that the students must know in order to make further progress in math. I am very proud of the hard work the students have been putting forth.

Light is the current topic being covered in Science. The students have been learning about the speed of light, reflection, refraction, colors of the light spectrum as well as. They have also been learning about how light travels through different things and how different objects can change how light appears.

#### **Fifth Grade**

Language Arts and Social Studies-Through our reading series, Fifth Grade students were presented with the essential question of What can people do to make positive change. We read a variety of texts and wrote an essay about individuals and groups that made positive change throughout our country's history including the times of the Women's Suffrage Movement and the Civil Rights Movement.

To wrap up our positive change theme, we also analyzed the artwork of Bryan Collier. His artwork of watercolor and collage appear in many books focusing on positive change including *Martin's Big Words, Rosa*, and *Clemente*. We were even able to watch his presentation from the Mazza Museum's Fall Conference where he was the Keynote Speaker. His presentation was so positive in the message that we are all individuals with our own unique talents and that we must keep trying even when we feel discouraged. #### Elementary Keyboarding

Fifth graders in Mrs. Plesec's and 6th graders in Mr. Uitto's classes have begun their keyboarding instruction during the 3rd nine weeks. The students in these classes are reviewing the techniques that they had learned in previous years to improve their keying. A majority of their individual grade goes toward their technique, or how they are typing, and is reinforced during each class as this is the most important part of keyboarding. How a student types affects his or her performance, so breaking bad habits is quite important. Fifth graders are working toward their goal of 25 words per minute, and the 6th grader's goal is 30 wpm. Both classes are continuing to use a program called Typing Agent which has multiple "worlds" that need to be completed. If time permits, both classes will be learning some of the basics of Google Docs and how to be safe online.

All 3<sup>rd</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> grade students will have keyboarding instruction for nine weeks during the school year. Mrs. Barton's 5<sup>th</sup> grade and Mrs. Prater's 6<sup>th</sup> grade classes will continue keyboarding lessons during the fourth nine weeks.

Keyboarding is as important as it was years ago, and is a skill that will be used throughout their lifetime. Many schools are re-introducing keyboarding in the lower elementary since achievement tests require students to be able to type extended or essay answers online. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice keyboarding correctly at home on a regular basis using any free keyboarding program.

#### 6th GRADE

Please continue to check over your students' <u>homework.</u> We know that they are looking for independence as they progress to Middle School, but we still encourage you to review your child's nightly work. We try to keep homework to a minimum, however we know it is important for student growth to bring work home to check for accuracy.

Every week, students have 5 Simple Solutions lessons to complete, 1-2 Study Island lessons in L. Arts/Math, 1 Readworks assignment. While there is ample amount of class time given, students will need to consistently work on these assignments outside of class, if not finished. Additionally, monthly AR goals are given to students. Reading nightly for 20 minutes is an expectation.

Language Arts this Winter:

• Students will also complete the process of writing an essay that will be informational as well as continue to work on argumentative writing.

• Students will begin to read the novel, Number the Stars in late February. This novel focuses on historical aspects of War World II, while building upon the theme of bravery and friendship.

• Students will continue to build their oral reading fluency and reading comprehension.

• Students continue to read Scope articles to understand nonfiction.

• Students are working on identifying test questions through a myriad of reading passages.

 Students continue to practice content standards using Study Island. Monthly AR goals are given and Students are achieving at High Standards!

Social Studies this Winter

Students are exploring the five ancient civilizations.

We have explored the first three monotheistic religions originated from this region.

### Library news from Mrs. Trusty

#### OverDrive eBooks:

We are now live with OverDrive eBooks! Through a consortium with NOACSC, Arcadia students and staff now have access to a shared collection of eBooks through OverDrive. All students and staff can access this collection using their Google accounts. You will find the Sora app (OverDrive's eBook app) with your Google tools by clicking on the "waffle" icon in your Google account. Students will choose Arcadia Library and sign in using their Google username. (It should come up automatically) The books are filtered for grade level appropriateness based on the patron who is logged in.

Students can check out 3 titles at one time with a lending period of 14 days. Please encourage students to "return" books when they are finished so they are available for other patrons in the shared collection.

We anticipate that this shared collection will grow over time and be another helpful resource for remote learning.

### In the Elementary library:

When students visit the elementary library, they return library books, participate in a read-aloud, work on a related activity and check out new library books. Read-alouds often complement lessons and topics they are exploring in their classrooms. This year we have completed computer coding activities, talked about online safety through Common Sense Media lessons, studied holidays within multiple cultures, researched topics using INFOhio resources, and talked about what it means to be a good friend. My goal every day is to match students with the right book, for both their interests and reading skills, to encourage a love of reading!

#### In the MS/HS library:

I am in the middle school/high school library each day during homeroom. Students may check out books then, or use the self-check out system during other times of the day.

All Arcadia students have access to INFOhio online resources anywhere there is an internet connection. Online resources, such as World Book Early Learning, World Book Kids, World Book Student and World Book Timeline, support literacy and research skills at every age. Resources are organized by grade level: Ages 3-5; GradesK-5; Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12.

#### End of 1<sup>st</sup> Semester

On January 21 & 22 students will be taking first semester exams. Exam schedules were given to staff on Thursday January 7 for review and then displayed in the building for students. This semester students will be granted an exemption from the first semester exam if they have earned an A/A- grade for the class. With parental permission students will not be required to attend a class if they are exempted from the exam. A schedule has been placed on the school website as well for parents to review.

#### Parent Teacher Conference

During the evening of February 12 teachers held conferences with parents to discuss the progress of their son or daughter. The February date was specifically chosen to communicate any issue that may cause a student to perform poorly in a semester or yearlong course. If a parent could not attend on the 12<sup>th</sup>, call our office to schedule a conference with a teacher anytime during the school year.

#### National Honor Society & National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony

During the evening of February 24, the following students will be inducted into the Arcadia chapters of NHS & NJHS. Once again due to COVID-19 the allcounty induction ceremony was eliminated this year and each individual school has conducted their own ceremony. If the ceremony goes well here I would like to continue holding one at our school for our students. We are scheduled to begin at 7:00 pm in the HS gym to accommodate all family members attendance and social distance. Everyone is welcome to attend.

#### AIR Spring Testing

Students in grades 7-12 are scheduled to participate in End of Course Exams in specific content area courses. It has not been made official, but rumored that ODE and the state legislature may exempt schools this year due to COVID -19. If the EOC exams are eliminated this year, all students and parents will be informed of those changes.

#### ACT Exam

The annual ACT test administration for our junior class will occur on March 9. All students in the 11<sup>th</sup> grade in Ohio must participate in the ACT exam as one of the three graduation options. Students will be transported to the Lions Club Community Center for the test administration. A lunch will be provided for the students and after the test students has concluded, students will be dismissed for the day with parent permission.

### From the Guidance Office:

Scholarship time is upon us again as is applying for schools. Parents of seniors it is always helpful to call the college or university's financial aid office with your questions. They have individual counselors trained to answer the most difficult of questions. Before any student can be awarded grants and scholarships, parents and students need to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is to be completed on line now and will save much time in correspondence. Again, once a student has chosen a school, questions can be directed to that school's financial aid office regarding the FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA can be a very stressful process; please be patient with each other and the particular school's financial aid office. The website opened for completing the application on October 1, 2020.

Reminder to all college bound juniors to register for the ACT (American College Test). The ACT is the predominant entry test for college in the Midwest. ACT wants students to register on line at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>. I also can help juniors or seniors who are struggling paying the registration fees with some fee waivers. The fee waiver is only good once a year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me with all of the requirements for this help. All current juniors will take the ACT during the school day on March 9<sup>th</sup> at the Community Center in the Arcadia Park. This ACT will be free of charge and lunch will be provided after testing. Juniors will bring home more information as the date approaches.

The Community Foundation Scholarships were available on-line beginning December 1<sup>st</sup>. All seniors should have received a post card from the Community Foundation explaining the process. Please encourage your senior to take advantage of this opportunity.

Results from the American Institute of Research (AIR tests or end of course tests) will be to the district by February 15<sup>th</sup>. I will meet with students who retested and explain the results. Spring testing will begin in April and run until May. Dates will be sent home and posted once finalized.

I will meet with students in grades 7-11 to begin the scheduling process at beginning of February. During the meeting times, I will have the information regarding CCP (College Credit Plus). This program allows students to take courses at local universities without tuition expenses. More information on the CCP program is in the update. If you are interested in your student participating, the intent form must be returned to the High School Guidance Office by March 30th.

In July of 2019, House Bill 166 was passed which changed the graduation requirements for students entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade July 1<sup>st</sup> of 2019. Effective with the graduating class of 2023 (our current sophomores) all students will be required to meet three criteria to earn a high school diploma.

**Criteria 1** will be earning 21 credits at Arcadia High School, which must consist of 4 English Credits, 4 Math Credits, 3 Science Credits, 3 Social Studies Credits, 1 Fine Arts Credit, ½ Health Credit, ½ PE credit, ½ Financial Literacy and 5 Elective Credits. This is unchanged from previous classes.

**Criteria 2** will be showing competency with receiving a passing score on Algebra I (9<sup>th</sup> grade) and English Language (10<sup>th</sup> grade) end of course tests. If a student struggles earning a passing score, there are three options which can replace the test scores. **These options are:** 1.) demonstrate two Career Focused Activities, 2.) enlist in the military, 3.) complete college coursework in English or Math.

**Criteria 3** will be showing readiness by earning 2 diploma seals during high school. There are 12 seals to earn, Ohio Means Jobs Readiness Seal, Industry-Recognized Credential Seal, College-Ready Seal, Military Enlistment Seal, Citizenship Seal, Science Seal, Honors Diploma Seal, Seal of Biliteracy, Technology Seal, Community Service Seal, Fine and Performing Arts Seal, and Student Engagement Seal. I have started meeting with the class of 2023 and 2024 to discuss the new requirements and distributed informational sheets to bring home.

### Middle School Technology

#### Business Foundations 7

The third 7<sup>th</sup> grade group in the rotation just started Business Foundations at the end of January. So far, the students have been continuing their keyboarding skills from elementary school and will have weekly digital citizenship lessons on finding a balance with social media, how social media affects relationships, cyberbullying, digital footprints, how companies collect and use data from online activity, and fair use rights for creators. Students are reminded that anything that is posted online, words and pictures, is there forever even after it is deleted from the device. All information posted online can be retrieved by future employers and college recruitment offices.

#### Information Technology 8

The second semester started in January with a new group of 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in Information Technology 8. Classes are brushing up on their keyboarding skills, looking over different types of documents using proofreader's marks to edit work and then setting up different types of documents correctly in Google Docs/ Microsoft Word as well as charts in Google Sheets/ Microsoft Excel. As students get further into the nine weeks and semester, they will be learning about Boolean operators, how computers work, and digital citizenship such as digital media and your brain, being aware of what you share, social media and digital footprints, online bias, and risks and consequences of inappropriate texting.

#### EIGHTH GRADE AMERICAN HISTORY

The eighth graders have spent the last several weeks learning about our nation's great document of government, the Constitution. While many celebrate the fourth of July with parades, family gatherings, and fireworks, the Constitution created the structure of our government with the branches and corresponding powers. The students have been evaluating the legislative, executive, and judicial branches with their roles and gualifications. They have learned key vocabulary and answered many questions where they examined the Constitution itself. The eighth graders also studied our amendments and completed an assignment where they were given simulations and had to identify the amendment and violation of our rights. Hopefully these scenarios will enable them to appreciate the outline of the government and its responsibilities. Each generation needs to continue to work to be engaged citizens to allow our republic to grow and flourish.

#### 7TH GRADE SCIENCE- Sinking or Buoyant

The students have been learning about density and how to determine whether items will sink or float when placed in a liquid. They have learned about Pascal, Archimedes, and Bernoulli. They did a great job determining why HUGE cruise ships can float! It has



been fun learning about physical science and now we will be learning about Earth Science for the rest of the year.


watching them grow in this particular field of study. Next, they will be learning the difference between mitosis and meiosis.



#### Miss Burke's ELA

#### 7th Grade:

Students finished out the first semester wrapping up the TM -D (Topic-Main Idea-Details) process for paraphrasing and summarizing passages along with continuing mastery of the Paragraph Writing Strategy. Currently, students are also still continuing to work on readings from Scholastic and completing Independent Practices for various reading skills. There also has been added STAR Reading Focus Skill days where we focus on a reading skill that as a class we need to improve upon, and we work to-



ward mastery of that focus skill. The goal is for the next time they take the STAR test, those skills will show improvement from students. In regards to writing, students are reviewing and working on mastery of compound sentences in order to write in a variety of sentence styles; they are then working

on applying this to their paragraph writing. The next step for students this 3rd quarter is to write their first argumentative essay in order to practice our persuasive skills along with applying textual evidence to an argument.

#### 8th grade:

Wrapping up the first semester, students have written two argumentative essays both with searching for their own research/evidence along with being given a passage to pull textual evidence from for their argument. The next type of essay students will be practicing this 3rd quarter will be an informational essay on identifying common themes within paired passages. Students are currently reading various Scholastic pieces centered around Black History Month. The most recent one was reading about Harriet Tubman and her work with the Underground Railroad. Finally, as students are completing both short and long readings, they are working on applying the INFER Strategy in order to better help with both Factual and Think and Seek type of comprehension questions.

## News from the High School Art Department

As we start a new Semester, I am excited to see

the progress my students are making with their art projects. Art III and IV students are working on a variety of independent projects ranging from cut paper sculpture to advanced painting techniques. Art II is currently working on a pen and Ink, half-moon project. Art I is working with techniques of gridding and portrait study. I am just beginning to work with a new group of 8<sup>th</sup> graders and looking forward to helping them learn the fundamentals of art.

I am including in this article images of some of the excellent artwork from the 1st semester. Their work speaks for itself. As always, I encourage staff, students, and parents to take time to view the display case across from the high school art room. I always try to incorporate a diverse collection of student artwork showcasing the talent of Arcadia's student artists.

### Middle School Math from Mrs. Carly Seery

#### 7th Grade Math


Since the last update, 7<sup>th</sup> grade math students have continued to embrace each new learning topic presented to them. After learning, practicing, and become very fluent with positive and negative numbers and operations they learned how to set up and solve one and two step equations and inequalities.

Continuing their understanding of proportional relationships and building off of their ratio work at the beginning of the year, students are currently immersed in a percentage unit covering taxes, tip, commission, discounts, mark-ups, amount of error, interest, which are all incorporated into real-life situations making the math relevant.

In the spring, we will focus on Geometry, covering relationships of two-dimensional shapes and three-dimensional figures, along with angles, solids, and measurement.

#### 8th Grade Math

After learning about scientific notation and being able to perform the four basic operations with numbers written in scientific notation, 8<sup>th</sup> grade math students connected their knowledge of proportional relationships from 7<sup>th</sup> grade to learn more about linear relationships whose y-intercept is not through the origin. Through this learning sequence, students explored the slope of lines through similar triangles and graphed many lines. Continuing to solve equations from their 7<sup>th</sup> grade learning, they became even more fluent with using the distributive property and combining like-terms in order to solve equations. They also learning how to identify the types of solutions of linear equations and now are able to tell if an equation will have one solution, no solution, or infinitely many solutions based on analyzing the slopes and y-intercepts of the equations. Currently they are in the middle of a Geometry unit on Congruence where they have been working with transformations. They have become good at translating, sliding, figures with an angle ruler and on a coordinate grid. In the weeks to come, they will be learning how to reflect and rotate figures.





#### English 12:

We are currently working our way through the Victorian era of British Literature. During this time there were great scientific advancements. It seemed fitting that we should explore the works of one of the fathers of Science Fiction. We are learning about the life of author, H.G. Wells, and the classes have voted on which H.G. Wells novel they would like to read. Both sections of English 12 voted on *The War of the Worlds*. We are tackling theories and possibilities of life on other planets and what it would be like to encounter these other lifeforms. We are also discussing topics within the book like exploration, and what humans and aliens might be willing to do when faced with extinction.

MR. FLUGGA'S CLASS UPDATES

Earlier this year we reviewed MLA which is used in the humanities fields. Now that we are learning about the scientific advances during the Victorian era and reading The War of the Worlds, we are focusing on APA writing style. APA is a method used for research, writing, and citing sources within the fields of mathematics and science. The students will later choose an argumentative topic, they will research that topic, choose a side to argue, and write an essay using APA style.

The students also periodically connect writing with learning life skills. The students watch a short video that teaches a skill they may need later in life and then they summarize and critique the video they have watched. Some of the topics we have covered so far have been: Establishing Credit, Changing a Flat Tire, Looking for Your First Apartment, Changing Your Oil, Filing Your Taxes For the First Time, And Basic First Aid. The students seem to find these activities informative and helpful.

#### English 10:

The Sophomores have begun learning about the Greek philosopher, Aristotle and the art of persuasion. We are getting into our public speaking portion of the curriculum. The students have selected products and researched that product. The next step is to use public speaking skills and the art of persuasion to convince their classmates that their product is superior to its rival. This activity will lead to group debates and finally an argumentative essay on a topic of their choice which they will research, and write incorporating ethos, pathos, and logos. These essays will be written using MLA style.

During this quarter we will be reading several short stories focusing on literary elements such as themes, symbols, purpose, and mood. We will be reading novels such as *Fahrenheit 451*, *Tuesdays With Morrie*, and *The Great Gatsby*. We will also get our togas ready as we read Julius Caesar and analyze the speeches within looking for elements of persuasion. We are also continuing to expand our vocabularies with weekly vocabulary lists. The state's standardized tests will be here before we know it, so we are continuing to practice and hone the skills needed for that exam.

#### Yearbook

This year's YB staff is small but very eager and excited to create an amazing 2021 Yearbook. The staff has been continuing to work on editing photos and arranging the various pages of the yearbook. They are working hard to make the 2021 Arcadian an incredible edition. #### Mr. Ebersole's English Apdate

As the old adage goes, slow and steady wins the race. Hopefully that is indeed as true as we have been led to believe, as the ongoing pandemic, the guidelines for dealing with it, & the weather as of late have each played their part in helping knock us off the pace a bit in our English endeavors this year. However, in the words of Confucius, the ancient Chinese philosopher, "It does not matter how slowly you go, so long as you do not stop." While we certainly have not slowed to a tortoise's pace, there is definitely ground to be made up in the spring of 2021. With a little luck, and a whole lot of perseverance, we – the students, the faculty & staff, and the community at large – will finish this daunting race off strong!

With that in mind, here's a brief update on what is happening with...

#### Freshman English

The 9<sup>th</sup> graders are in the midst of an intensive mythology unit culminating in their reading of Homer's *Odyssey*, a viewing of the motion picture *O Brother, Where Art Thou?* and a lengthy comparison & contrast essay focused upon the two. Many students have seen the film, or are at least familiar with it, but they are generally unaware that the latter is actually a contemporary adaptation of Homer's epic narrative. As always, we are busy with a steady diet of vocabulary work. A focus on nonfiction writing looms on the horizon with an eye towards argumentation/debate and a study of William Shakespeare.

#### Junior English

Having concluded our reading of Arthur Miller's classic contemporary play, *The Crucible*, and completed a large research project, we are continuing our examination of early American literature by focusing on the time period encompassing the Revolutionary War. A public speaking component will cap this unit wherein each student will attempt to persuade his or her audience to their personal point of view on a particular topic that is of importance in their eyes in much the same way as the texts by founding fathers Jefferson & Franklin, among others, whom we have examined. The ability to identify key ideas and pull important information from a challenging text, oftentimes full of difficult and unfamiliar vocabulary, is a skill that will serve our graduates well when they leave the hallowed halls of Arcadia High School, whether they plan to pursue higher learning or enter the workforce. This work is very challenging. However, in the words of Thomas Paine, from *The Crisis*, a document our juniors recently examined, "What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly...."


#### CC+ Composition

This course, offered in conjunction with Franklin University, seeks to strengthen the students' understanding of the importance of the writing process – in particular, with regard to revision and peer editing, and offer up practice in expository writing with an emphasis on the techniques of shorter, formal composition. We have more or less hit the halfway mark and improvement is evident in our writing. We will continue to examine exemplar writings by well-respected writers in order to produce original, high-quality works that properly address the task at hand.
