We are very excited that our greenhouse will finally be built, in a location which is easily accessible for all grade levels. It is hard to believe it has been four years since the old greenhouse was removed on the east side of the property to make way for the parking lot to be installed. 

Elementary Keyboarding ~ Ms. Marguart

Fifth graders in Mrs. Barton's and Mrs. Mankin's classes and 6th graders in Mr. Uitto's and Mrs. Prater's classes completed keyboarding during the 3rd and 4th nine weeks by completing lessons in "worlds" using a program called Typing Agent. Typing Agent helps students increase their speed, accuracy, and fluency. Fifth graders should key approximately 25 wpm and sixth graders should key 30 wpm. Students must achieve 85 percent or higher on each lesson in order to advance to the next lesson or after four re-tries when the program allows students to move on. This gives students more practice if they have not achieved the proper level before being able to continue with the next lesson.

Technology is a huge part of our lives as well as a part of school testing and needed for the workforce, which means learning keyboarding skills is still as important as it was years ago. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice keyboarding skills at home on a regular basis, including during the summertime.





From the Guidance Office:

The class of 2024 has 51 seniors with 8 receiving honors diplomas, 17 have been accepted to a four-year college. 12 have chosen a two year college. 1 has enlisted in the United States Navy and 1 into the Army Reserves, and the remainder have chosen join the work force or are still undecided. As of May 25th, the students who have chosen to continue their education have earned \$289,410 in scholarship for their first year with a projection of \$874,640 over four years.

College Credit Plus is now in its eighth year replacing PSEOP. The class of 2024 had 29 students participate in College Credit Plus (CCP) during their high school career. These students earned 520 semester hours which is equal to 15 semesters. One semester at a four-year state/public college averages \$11,500. The class of 2024 saved \$494,500 in college tuition!! Arcadia High School is also partnering with Franklin University and offering one English course and 2 Mathematics courses during the school day taught by Arcadia teachers!! Students have the opportunity to earn 11 College Credits and not leave the school!!

State testing will close on May 10th this school year. Each test contained two parts, an extended response section and a multiple-choice section. The third, fourth, sixth, and seventh grade took tests in Language Arts and Math, fifth and eighth grade took Language Arts, Math and Science, ninth grade took Math and American History, tenth grade took, Language Arts, Math and Biology, and eleventh grade took American Government. The district has received the preliminary results and teachers are examining the item analysis. Once the district receives the family letters, the results will be mailed home. All tests were given on lap tops. The middle and high school tested in the community building in the park.

The scheduling process is almost complete and students will receive an opportunity to fine tune their schedules before the end of the school year. All students are required to have only one study hall for next year. It is important for all high school athletes to have more than the Ohio High School Athletic Association **bare** minimum of 5 credits. A student athlete must be passing 5 credits in the immediately preceding nine weeks order to be academically eligible or they will be in-eligible for an entire nine weeks grading period. Please review your student's schedule with them. All changes need to be completed before the summer break as my last day in the office will be June 17th.

The summer is a great time for juniors and their parents to make a college visit or two. Colleges and universities have times set aside for the next year's seniors to tour their campuses. It is very important for your student to physically visit their schools of choice.

The final time to take the ACT is June 8th. Students can register on-line at www.actstudent.org.



Earth Science



Generally, at this time of year, I am approached by the concerned parents of students that have struggled in language arts, for one reason or another, inquiring about what could be done to help their children with their deficiencies over the summer break. My advice has always remained consistent: Make sure that your child is reading as much as possible! It sounds so simple and obvious, and it is, but the biggest issues that most students face in their English courses are directly correlated to their inability to effectively read and comprehend the literature in their class. In short, these students need more practice with their reading fluency and comprehension. This by no means is to say that a struggling Language Arts student should immediately run to the public library and check out a copy of Leo Tolstoy's War & Peace. On the contrary, what I am suggesting is that these students need to read more often to improve their skill sets, not that they select more complex and lengthy works of literature to read. To foster their growth, encourage your children to take a little time every day to read something manageable like a newspaper or a magazine article. However, this sort of daily reading need not come in traditional print formats. Getting a magazine subscription to a publication that interests your student, or even a website that updates content frequently, is a great first step! Articles from the internet, blogs, and even comic books/graphic novels will all help to get a struggling reader some extra practice over the summer break. Remember that it is not really what the student reads that is important; it is that they are reading consistently that will benefit them in the long run.

As a parting word, I would like to congratulate the class of 2024 on their graduation from Arcadia High School and wish them all the best of luck in their future endeavors! I have had the privilege of getting to know many of you very well over the past several years and I am very confident that each and every one of you have the skill sets necessary to lead you through the next phase of you lives and on to the realization of your dreams. Introduction to Business

The nine weeks has been a busy one with Intro to Business students working on digital marketing and social media activities. Using business scenarios, students had to determine what type of digital marketing and social media to use that best suited the company. Once digital marketing was finished, the class moved on to learn about money and the financial system such as different types of banking institutions, the functions of money, characteristics of money, The Federal Reserve and its purpose, nonbanking institutions, and the future of banking. Currently, the class is finishing up the last chapter of the year...management, what managers do, and management styles.
