FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The November five year financial forecast has been submitted to the Ohio Department of Education. The district operates on a fiscal year basis (July 1 – June 30). We are currently in Fiscal Year 22 which includes the time period from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. Below is a forecast summary that shows the district's revenue and expenditures over the last three fiscal years and a projection of the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years. Fiscal years 2019 through 2021 are actual numbers. Fiscal years 2022 through 2026 are estimates or "forecasted" numbers. A number of factors are taken into consideration when forecasting into future years. Changes in the economy affect both income tax receipts and real estate collections, all of which impact the revenue collections. The district currently receives approximately 42% of its revenue from real estate tax collections and approximately 32% of its revenue from state foundation aid. Building repairs and upgrades, personnel costs and utilities all impact the expenditure side. The addition of the four new classrooms, the parking lot upgrades and the new entry on the east side of the campus were all completed through the establishment of capital improvement funds created for the purpose of funding these projects. An additional capital improvements fund has been created for use towards future projects which will coincide with the District's Strategic Plan. As treasurer, I continue to monitor the district's spending in every effort to remain fiscally committed to our taxpayers. Deficit spending is in the forecast but should be offset with carryover funds. Taxpayers have continued to support the renewal levies as needed by the district, therefore the district is not projecting a need for new money but simply continuation of current funding from the community.



News from J.R. Haupert Elementary Principal

First of all, I want to give all stakeholders a big shout out for all of the hard work being done this school year. Our Students and staff have been working extremely hard trying to close the gap caused by COVID-19. Between supply shortages and the normal grind of the school year, our community, students, families and staff have all proven to be the foundation of Arcadia - and for that I say thank you.



The Winter Benchmark Assessment was very promising. We saw an 18% increase in Language Arts from Fall. In Math we saw a 2% increase from Fall. We have been working towards the entire building to score 80% of students at grade level by the end of the school year. This is a great measure for us to be able to predict how we will score on the Ohio State Tests. Our goal for the Winter Benchmark was to have the building at 65% at grade level. In Language Arts we were at 64% and Math was at 66%. Though we were just shy of that goal - the amount of growth we saw is very exciting and should be celebrated. If we are able to continue that trend, we will be able to attain 80% of students at grade level in the Spring!



A large reason we are showing as much growth as we are, is due to the hard work being done by all in the building. Classroom teachers adjusting material for students to meet them at their level, adjusting teaching practices to best meet the needs of all students. I have noticed in the building since PBIS implementation - more positive affirmations being made to students by staff and by students to staff. Another piece that is helping our growth is the after school intervention program. We need to continue this positive talk in order to build a place we all enjoy being part of.



At this time, we have 65 students taking advantage of after school intervention. After school intervention has been running since December and we are noticing solid gains by those students participating. Please continue to have conversations with your students about the things they are practicing and learning at school. These conversations allow connections to be built in the brain and allow for retention of information learned. Another great practice is to read one book a night. This is great family time and allows our brains to decompress from the day's events.

Looking towards the future, we will have Ohio State Tests starting at the end of March. Testing will be finished before we move our way into May. There will be more information coming for specific test dates. We are working with the FFA to bring back Ag Day for our 4th and 5th grade students. Information regarding Race for Education will be coming out soon, if you haven't already received it. Remember this is a great fundraising event for the school - it allows us to cover the cost of field trips, student prizes, various equipment/materials for students and teachers!

Elementary Keyboarding

Student in Mrs. Schilling's and Mr. Baker's 4th grade classes worked extremely well during the second nine weeks reviewing and building on their keyboarding skills from 3rd grade. Both classes worked on correct finger placement on the home row, keeping arms, hands, and wrists off of the laptop and table, sitting up straight, and keeping their eyes on the monitor all while working toward 20 wpm and 85% or higher accuracy. After several weeks of consistent practice and using keyboard covers, many students worked their way through lessons on the home row keys, top row keys, and some had gotten as far as the bottom row keys as well as using the shift keys to capitalize letters.



4th Grade **Keyboarding Awards**

All 3rd through 6th grade students will have keyboarding instruction for nine weeks during the school year. Mrs. Plesec's 5th grade and Mr. Uitto's 6th grade students are

continuing keyboarding lessons during the third nine weeks. So far, both classes are iob on their lessons.

achievement tests require students to be able to type extended or essay answers online as well as using the mouse to drag and drop answers, so keyboarding and mouse skills is still as important as it was years ago. Schools that once dropped keyboarding are now implementing keyboarding classes back into the curriculum. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice these skills correctly at home on a regular basis using any free keyboarding program.




This week's unit in **third grade** was all about the Oregon Trail! The students read informational texts about the difficult journey and personal journals of pioneers that

4th Grade Language Arts & Social Studies



The 4th grade students have been working extremely hard this school year! In language arts students have been introduced to all of the state standard reading skills through a multitude of genres. Additionally, students have been focusing on writing both informational and opinion essays. For our informational essay, students selected an animal of their choice and researched this topic. Furthermore, for our opinion essay, students wrote to an adult in the school about something they wanted to see change. As we approach state testing at the end of March, we will work on mastering all standards that will be covered. With the work ethic of this group, I have no doubt that they will all do great!

In social studies, we have been moving through our history strand. We started with studying Native American tribes that have lived in Ohio. Then, we moved into studying the 13 colonies, the American Revolutionary War, and westward expansion. After completing our Native American unit, students had to create a shoebox diorama of a tribe of their choosing. These turned out fantastic, and the students did a great job of incorporating characteristics of their tribe.


I am truly proud of the work the 4th grade has completed so far. We will continue to work and push them to show maximum work the rest of this year!






Fourth graders were busy making fossil molds with objects they brought from home. After the molds became hard, they filled in their molds with playdough to create a cast of the fossil.


We are moving on to ecosystems and the living and nonliving things that reside in different habitats/ecosystems and how living organisms get their energy.



In math we finished all of our multiplication and division and will be moving on to fractions. In the meantime, they need to know the difference between a multiple and a factor to create equivalent fractions.







Snow Much Fun in Fifth Grade!

With February bringing the area a large snowfall and blizzard like conditions, Fifth Grade decided to take advantage of this opportunity and explore SNOW.



We began by watching weath-



er forecasts and learning some of the terms meteorologists use in their weather predictions. We then read a nonfiction text about how snow forms, from being a small crystal joining to the full formation to a snowflake.

We moved onto a biography about Wilson Bentley who is considered to be the first known person to take detailed photographs of snowflakes and record their features. However, after watching a documentary on Bent-



ley, we discovered there was also a German meteorologist/photographer who was in competition with Bentley, prompting good discussions about perspective and competition.

During our snow research, and after a few videos, we began talking about the snowplows and how towns and cities navigate through the snow storms.

Our favorite question/joke of the day was "How does the snowplow driver get to work?"

This question lead to a full STEM activity in which students brought a toy vehicle to school and created a snowplow for their vehicle. Toilet paper tubes served as the cardboard to make the plow, straws worked for the hydraulic system, and everything from twist ties to paper clips were used to attach the plow to the vehicles. The plows turned out great with some designing a straight plow and others choosing the v shaped design. We actually took the vehicles/plows outside and plowed snow with them!!



6th Grade News

Please continue to check over your students' homework. We know that they are looking for independence as they progress to Middle School, but we still encourage you to review your child's nightly work. We try to keep homework to a minimum, however we know it is important for student growth to bring work home to check for accuracy.

Every week, students have 5 Simple Solutions lessons to complete, 1-2 Study Island lessons in

L. Arts/Math, 1 Readworks assignment. While there is an ample amount of class time given, students will need to consistently work on these assignments outside of class, if not finished. Additionally, monthly AR goals are given to students. Reading nightly for 20 minutes is an expectation.

So far, every student has met their Accelerated Reader goal since September. Congratulations on working hard Sixth Grade. Language Arts this Winter:

• Students will continue to complete the process of writing an essay that will be informational as well as continue to work on argumentative writing.

• Students started read the novel, Number the Stars in early February. This novel focuses on historical aspects of War World II, while building upon the theme of bravery and friendship.

- Students will continue to build their oral reading fluency and reading comprehension.
- Students continue to read Scope articles to understand nonfiction.
- Students are working on identifying test questions through a myriad of reading passages.
- Students continue to practice content standards using Study Island.
- Monthly AR goals are given and Students are achieving at High Standards!

Social Studies this Winter

- Students are exploring the five ancient civilizations.
- We have explored the first three monotheistic religions originated from this region.

Next, more in depth of religions will be covered.

Things Happening in Mr. Uitto' Classroom:

In Mr. Uitto's class, there are lots of different activities are taking place:

*Students have learned the order of operations (PEDMAS)

*Venn diagrams have been used to compare plant and animal cells.


*Interactive notebooks are being used to take notes, make comparisons, and write about cells.



Middle School Technology

Business Foundations 7

The second group of 7th graders in the rotation completed the Business Foundations 7 course during the 2nd nine weeks. Students continued their keyboarding skills from elementary school and received weekly lessons on digital citizenship. Topics included the good and bad of social media, balancing social media, how social media affects relationships, cyber bullying, digital footprints, how companies collect and use data from online activity as well as how apps are intentionally created to form an addictive behavior. Mr. Saltzman, Arcadia's Safety and Security Directory, spoke to the students on the importance of being safe while online and reminded students that anything that is posted online is actually there forever, even after it is deleted from the device. Mr. Saltzman also went over the laws of posting or sending anything inappropriate to those under the age of 18.

The third group of 7th graders is half way through the course with their lessons and are doing a fantastic job of completing them on time! Students have started digital citizenship by completing "My Social Media Life" which is a discussion about the affects social media has on relationships.

Information Technology 8

The second semester started with two new groups of 8th grade students in Information Technology 8. Classes are currently brushing up on their keyboarding skills and have started digital citizenship lessons with "Digital Media and Your Brain." Student discussion and projects were set around how devices, games, and apps are created to "hook" people through continued use of those devices, games, and apps.

As students get further into the nine weeks and semester, they will be using Google Docs and Microsoft Word to set up various types of documents, use Boolean operators for Internet searches, and learning how the computer and networks work.

From the Guidance Office:

Scholarship time is upon us again as is applying for schools. Parents of seniors it is always helpful to call the college or university's financial aid office with your questions. They have individual counselors trained to answer the most difficult of questions. Before any student can be awarded grants and scholarships, parents and students need to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is to be completed on line now and will save much time in correspondence. Again, once a student has chosen a school, questions can be directed to that school's financial aid office regarding the FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA can be a very stressful process; please be patient with each other and the particular school's financial aid office. The website opened for completing the application on October 1, 2021.

Reminder to all college bound juniors to register for the ACT (American College Test). The ACT is the predominant entry test for college in the Midwest. ACT wants students to register on line at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>. I also can help



juniors or seniors who are struggling paying the registration fees with some fee waivers. The fee waiver is only good once a year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me with all of the requirements for this help. All current juniors will take the ACT during the school day on March 9th at the Community Center in the Arcadia Park. This ACT will be free of charge and lunch will be provided after

testing. Juniors will bring home more information as the date approaches.

The Community Foundation Scholarships were available on-line beginning December 1st. All seniors should have received a post card from the Community Foundation explaining the process. Please encourage your senior to take advantage of this opportunity. The site closed the first week of February, 2022.

Results from the American Institute of Research (AIR tests or end of course tests) will be to the district by February 14th. I will meet with students who retested and explain the results. Spring testing will begin in April and run until May. Dates will be sent home and posted once finalized.

I will meet with students in grades 7-11 to begin the scheduling process in February and March. During the meeting times, I will have the information regarding CCP (College Credit Plus). This program allows students to take courses at local universities without tuition expenses. More information on the CCP program is in the update. If you are interested in your student participating, the intent form must be returned to the High School Guidance Office by March 30th.

In July of 2019, House Bill 166 was passed which changed the graduation requirements for students entering 9th grade July 1st of 2019. Effective with the graduating class of 2023 (our current juniors) all students will be required to meet three criteria to earn a high school diploma.

Criteria 1 will be earning 21.5 credits at Arcadia High School, which must consist of 4 English Credits, 4 Math Credits, 3 Science Credits, 3 Social Studies Credits, 1 Fine Arts Credit, ½ Health Credit, ½ PE credit, ½ Financial Literacy and 5 Elective Credits. This is unchanged from previous classes.

Criteria 2 will be showing competency with receiving a competent score on Algebra I (9th grade) and English Language (10th grade) end of course tests. If a student struggles earning a passing score, there are three options which can replace the test scores. **These options are:** 1.) *demonstrate two Career Focused Activities, 2.*) *enlist in the military, 3.*) *complete college coursework in English or Math.*


Criteria 3 will be showing readiness by earning 2 diploma seals during high school. There are 12 seals to earn, Ohio Means Jobs Readiness Seal, Industry-Recognized Credential Seal, College-Ready Seal, Military Enlistment Seal, Citizenship Seal, Science Seal, Honors Diploma Seal, Seal of Biliteracy, Technology Seal, Community Service Seal, Fine and Performing Arts Seal, and Student Engagement Seal. I have started meeting with the class of 2023 and 2024 to discuss the new requirements and distributed informational sheets to bring home.

7th Grade Math

Even with all of the winter weather that has come our way, 7th grade math students have continued to embrace each new learning topic presented to them. After learning, practicing, and become very fluent with positive and negative numbers and operations they learned how to set up and solve one and two step equations and inequalities.

Continuing their understanding of proportional relationships and building off of their ratio work at the beginning of the year, students are currently immersed in a percentage unit covering taxes, tip, commission, discounts, mark-ups, amount of error, interest, which are all incorporated into real-life situations making the math relevant.



During spring, we will focus on Geometry, covering relationships of twodimensional shapes and threedimensional figures, along with angles, solids, and measurement.

8th Grade Math

After learning about scientific notation and being able to perform the four basic operations with numbers written in scientific notation, 8th grade math students connected their knowledge of proportional relationships from 7th grade to learn more about linear relationships whose y-intercept is not through the origin. Through this learning sequence, students explored the slope of lines through similar triangles and graphed many lines.

Continuing to solve equations from their 7th grade learning, they became even more fluent with using the distributive property and combining like-terms in order to solve equations. They also learning how to identify the types of solutions of linear equations and now are able to tell if an equation will have one solution, no solution, or infinitely many solutions based on analyzing the slopes and y-intercepts of the equations.

Currently they are finishing up a unit on Functions, learning the fundamental concepts of what a function is. They have also spent time practicing with linear functions, identifying the rate of change, the initial value, and how those two pieces fit into an equation that models the relationship. Their last step in the unit was to analyze graphs of functions and match up the graph to a real-life situation describing it.




Coming up next, they will be working on Geometry concepts covering Transformations, the Pythagorean theorem, and measurement of angles, triangles, and three-dimensional solids.

7TH GRADE SCIENCE-It's out of this World!

We have been studying the atmosphere and the importance of it. They learned about the Troposphere, Stratosphere, Mesosphere, Thermosphere and Exosphere. The students learned where the ionosphere and ozone were located. They even made a graph showing the layers, the temperature, and the size of the layers. Now, we're headed to the beach to talk about spring and neap tides. We're tired of all this snow!



8TH GRADE SCIENCE-It's Heredity



The 8th graders are busy reviewing for the state tests and learning the difference between pedigrees and Punnett squares. They can even tell you about dominant traits, recessive traits, codominance and incomplete dominance. Next, we are going to study mitosis, meiosis, and DNA. It's what makes everyone in the world unique-unless you happen to be an identical twin.

Hello! My name is Morgan Gephart, one of the social studies teachers at Arcadia High School.

I cannot believe it is already the third quarter, time flies when you're having fun! At Arcadia, I teach seventh grade World History, freshmen American History, and Psychology/Sociology. In these classes we have studied and researched multiple historical topics through many different projects and activities. My students say that they are "teacher fun" but I can tell they all enjoy them in the end.

To start off the year in my seventh grade World History class, we talked about the different components of a map. To build onto their knowledge of a map, the students were required to create their very own map of an amusement park of their choosing. There were many very creative ideas which made it a fun learning experience for them as they expanded their knowledge of creating a scale, a legend/key, cardinal directions, correct labels, and a creative title. In between now and then, we have also done many other projects but currently the students are working on an activity that teaches them about ancient Roman architecture. Using google maps, the students travel around the world to visit many different sites such as the Colosseum, Aqueducts, roads in Pompeii, and Roman baths to discover how each of these significant architectural advances were created in a time period so long ago and how they had a lasting impact on the architecture we have today.

In my American History class, for the past couple of weeks, the freshmen have been learning about the Progressive Movement and America becoming an Imperialistic nation. Every day I challenge the students with a new class activity to expand on their notes. A couple weeks ago, we talked about the Spanish-American war and the United States involvement. We discussed yellow journalism and how it spread fake news in the United States to encourage us to enter the war. The students learned how this form of journalism was essentially, in some cases, very inaccurate. In some cases, students were able to identify how the news they see today can be just the same as Yellow Journalism. During the Progressive Movement, the students researched the 18th, and 19th amendments to determine the significance of them and how they helped to shape American History. So far this year has been a lot of fun! I look forward to a great second semester at Arcadia as I continue to create fun and engaging activities for the students!


Mr. Flugga's Class Updates

English 12:

The seniors are wrapping up the Restoration Era AKA "The Age of Enlightenment." We have read famous works by Samuel Pepys, Daniel Defoe, and one of history's first feminists, Mary Wollstonecraft. We will continue to work our way through the evolution of British Literature. In the near future, we will embrace the Victorian era and dive into the science fiction work of H.G. Wells. The seniors are also learning the fundamentals of APA-style writing. This will lead to their first argumentative essay of the year. On top of analyzing literature and developing their writing ability, they are also building on their life skills. Since the last update, the seniors have watched videos and written critiques over the following skills:

Finding your first apartment. Filing your taxes. Basic cooking Changing your oil. Interviewing for a job.

The students watch short videos showing these life skills and they incorporate their writing skills by writing critiques and evaluations over the videos.



English 10:

The Sophomores have begun learning about the Greek philosopher, Aristotle and the art of persuasion. We are getting into our public speaking portion of the curriculum. The students have selected products and researched that product. The next step is to use public speaking skills and the art of persuasion to convince their classmates that their product is superior to its rival. This activity will lead to group debates and finally an argumentative essay on a topic of their choice which they will research, and write incorporating ethos, pathos, and logos. These essays will be written using MLA style.

During this quarter we will be reading several short stories focusing on literary elements such as themes, symbols, purpose, and mood. We will be reading novels such as *Fahrenheit 451* and *Tuesdays With Morrie*. We will also get our togas ready as we read Julius Caesar and analyze the speeches within looking for elements of persuasion. We are continuing to expand our vocabulary with weekly vocabulary lists. The state's standardized tests will be here before we know it, so we are continuing to practice and hone the skills needed for that exam.

Biology

WHAT NID GREGOR MENDEI the differences between mitosis and meiosis. Mitosis is **Moobea** how we develop cells in our body. Meiosis undergoes a

similar process, but only occurs in reproductive cells. In the month of February, we have been studying the topic of genetics. Genetics

In Biology, we finished our unit on Ecology and Cell

structure & function. Students have recently learned



is the study of how genes and heredity impact not just the physical appearance of an animal, plant, etc. It also can determine our susceptibility to conditions such as cystic fibrosis or Huntington's Disease. Soon we'll be learning about the structure of our DNA and why it is important.

Anatomy & Physiology

We have been racking our brains while studying how the nervous system works. What is the nervous system? Why, it is the reason you can move, think, recall a memory and react to loud noises. Our students just finished dissecting a sheep brain to learn about the anatomy of the brain. You'd be surprised with the way our brain is similar to a sheep in terms of anatomy. (Yet so different). I told the students one piece of advice: Do not let this unit get on your "nerves". We also used our senses to study how we are able to use our eyes, nose, tongue and ears for sensing. After our unit on the nervous system, we will study the cardiovascular system (blood, heart and blood vessels)

Earth Science

What's the difference between weather and climate? You can't weather a tree, greater than 5.0 magnitude on but you can climate.

In Earth Science, we are wrapping up our discussion on earthquakes. Students built a wooden building that could withstand an earthquake the Richter scale, measuring the amount of energy re-

leased. The Modified Mercalli scale measures the intensity of the earthquake. and seismologists (study earthquakes) will often use both to help decide how powerful an earthquake was in an area. Next, we will begin learning about meteorology, which focuses on weather patterns in our atmosphere.

Mr. Ebersole's English Update

Freshman English

The 9th graders are near the finish of an intensive mythology unit culminating in their reading of Homer's *Odyssey*, a viewing of the motion picture O Brother, Where Art Thou? and a lengthy comparison & contrast essay focused upon the two. Many students have seen the film, or are at least familiar with it, but they are generally unaware that the latter is actually a contemporary adaptation of Homer's epic narrative. As always, we are busy with a steady diet of vocabulary work. A focus on nonfiction writing looms on the horizon once a study of William Shakespeare, and a reading of Romeo & Juliet, is complete.

Junior English

Having concluded our reading of Arthur Miller's classic contemporary play, The Crucible, and completed a large research project, we examined the early American literature encompassing the Revolutionary War. The ability to identify key ideas and pull important information from a challenging text, oftentimes full of difficult and unfamiliar vocabulary, is a skill that will serve our graduates well when they leave the hallowed halls of Arcadia High School, whether they plan to pursue higher learning or enter the workforce. We will continue our focus on American writers from the American Renaissance going forward into the second semester. This work is very challenging. However, in the words of Thomas Paine, from The Crisis, a document our juniors recently examined, "What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly...."

CC+ Composition

This course, offered in conjunction with Franklin University, seeks to strengthen the students' understanding of the importance of the writing process - in particular, with regard to revision and peer editing, and offer up practice in expository writing with an emphasis on the techniques of shorter, formal composition. We have more or less hit the halfway mark and improvement is evident in our writing. We will continue to examine exemplar writings by well-respected writers in order to produce original, high-guality works that properly address the task at hand. This coming spring our year will culminate with research and an ensuing persuasive writing on a contemporary and controversial topic of each student's choosing.
