The school year seems to be racing by as we are well into the second semester. To bring you up to date as a district, we have had a lot going on in regards to facility upkeep/improvement, improvements in the process for instruction as well as with our school climate.

In regard to facilities, we have waterlines for the 1954 and 1961 additions that will be needing replaced. We also plan to do a significant amount of repairs on a number of our roofs. These projects will be scheduled as summer projects. Currently, we are adjusting work spaces within the school to make us more efficient. Our school Psychologist and Athletic Director offices will be moving to new locations along with where we do our concessions for sporting events.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The November five year financial forecast has been submitted to the Ohio Department of Education. The district operates on a fiscal year basis (July 1 – June 30). We are currently in Fiscal Year 23 which includes the time period from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. Below is a forecast summary that shows the district's revenue and expenditures over the last three fiscal years and a projection of the current fiscal year and the following four fiscal years. Fiscal years 2020 through 2022 are actual numbers. Fiscal years 2023 through 2027 are estimates or "forecasted" numbers. A number of factors are taken into consideration when forecasting into future years. Changes in the economy affect both income tax receipts and real estate collections, all of which impact the revenue collections. The district currently receives approximately 44% of its revenue from real estate tax collections and approximately 35% of its revenue from state foundation aid. Building repairs and upgrades, personnel costs and utilities all impact the expenditure side. The addition of the four new classrooms, the parking lot upgrades and the new entry on the east side of the campus were all completed through the establishment of capital improvement funds created for the purpose of funding these projects. An additional capital improvements fund has been created for use towards future projects which will coincide with the District's Strategic Plan. As treasurer, I continue to monitor the district's spending in every effort to remain fiscally committed to our taxpayers. Deficit spending is in the forecast but should be offset with carryover funds. Taxpayers have continued to support the renewal levies as needed by the district, therefore the district is not projecting a need for new money but simply continuation of current funding from the community.

From J.R. Haupert, Elementary Principal

Here we are nearly 3 quarters completed in the 2022-2023 school year! We have been working extremely hard and are making steady progress on our District's Strategi in the areas of instruction, climate and community.

In the area of instruction, our k-3 staff has been doing a lot of professional development around basic reading skills. This includes diving into a book study about how to be reading into a balanced literacy classroom. We have also started the process of reviewing our curriculum in the elementary and found a need to begin updating what we are currer the need of high quality instructional materials by Ohio's state standards. This process will continue into next school year and look to update our ELA materials for the 2024-2025 states.

For the 4-6 staff they have been doing work around assessment literacy and looking at how our assessments align to Ohio's learning standards. Our Winter Benchmark Assessments reflected this work being done by the teachers as we saw a 12% increase in the number of students considered on track for ELA. W students on track to 192. For math we grew 6% from fall to winter. We had 157 students considered on track in the fall and now have 168 students on track in the winter. Our end o have each grade level be at 80% or higher as measured by STAR (K-2) or on the Ohio State Assessments (3-6). If we are able to maintain our level of growth from winter to spring extremely close to meeting our goals!

In the areas of climate and community we have been very active in the building and outside of the building. We were able to have a Christmas Theme day before break. various activities and students in grades K-3 were able to get a picture with Santa. Grades 4-6 had a photobooth that they were able to take some fun pictures in. Thanks to Mrs. T to get field trips setup for all grade levels to visit The Mazza Museum at the University of Findlay. Groups were able to tour the museum, visit their planetarium and participate in S⁻ grade will be visiting Greenfield Village again this year in the middle of May.

A huge thank you to those on our staff and PTA for assisting with our Daddy Daughter Dance. This was very successful again, with over 108 girls signing up and attendir was able to participate in Read Across America Week. 



Recently, students wrote an opinion essay on whether video games or self-driving cars are beneficial or harmful. After we cover all the state standards for 4th grade, we will move into novel studies where students will work in groups.

In social studies we are moving right along within our history strand. Students learned about the Native American tribes that lived in the Ohio area, and they completed a shoebox diorama project on a tribe we covered. Now our focus is on the colonists earning their independence and conflicts between the settlers and Native American tribes. When we get closer to the end of the school year, students will choose a person to research for our annual Biography Fair.

Sixth Grade News:

Please continue to check over your students' homework. We know that they are looking for independence as they progress to Middle School, but we still encourage you to review your child's nightly work. We try to keep homework to a minimum, however we know it is important for student growth to bring work home to check for accuracy.

Every week, students have 5 Simple Solutions lessons to complete, 1-2 Study Island lessons in L. Arts/Math, 1 Readworks and/or Common Lit assignment. While there is ample amount of class time given, students will need to consistently work on these assignments outside of class, if not finished. Additionally, monthly AR goals are given to students. Reading nightly for 20 minutes is an expectation.

So far, every student has met their Accelerated Reader goal since September. Congratulations on working hard Sixth Grade.

Language Arts this winter::

- Students will continue to complete the process of writing an essay that will be informational as well as continue to work on argumentative writing.
- Students started read the novel, Number the Stars in early February. This novel focuses on histori-• cal aspects of War World II, while building upon the theme of bravery and friendship.
- Students will continue to build their oral reading fluency and reading comprehension. •
- Students continue to read Scope articles to understand nonfiction. •
- Students are working on identifying test questions through a myriad of reading passages.
- Students continue to practice content standards using Study Island. •
- Monthly AR goals are given and Students are achieving at High Standards!

Social Studies:

- Students have finished exploring the five ancient civilizations.
- Students will create their own ancient civilization project and present their slide show to the class.
- Our main focus for the remainder of the year is reviewing using our Simple Solutions book. This has enabled us to complete our standards in a timely manner.

Math:

- \Rightarrow Students are being introduced to algebra
- \Rightarrow State test preparation has begun
- \Rightarrow Students continue to master standards from Simple Solutions; Lesson 100!
- \Rightarrow Students have completed over 2/3 of the Study Island lessons



Elementary Keyboarding

Students in Mr. Baker's and Mrs. Schilling's classes completed keyboarding instruction for this school year. Students were awarded for the highest words per minute, highest accuracy, and staying focused.



4th grade keyboarding award winners Fifth graders in Mrs. Barton's and 6th graders in Mr. Uitto's classes are halfway through keyboarding instruction for the 3rd nine weeks. The students in these classes are reviewing the techniques that they had learned in previous years and are working to improve their keying skills. A majority of their individual grade goes toward their technique, or how they are typing, and is reinforced during each class as this is the most important part of keyboarding. How a student types affects his or her performance, so breaking bad habits is quite important. Fifth graders are working toward their goal of 25 words per minute, and the 6th grade goal is 30 wpm. Both classes are continuing to use a program called Typing Agent which has multiple "worlds" that need to be completed.

All 3rd through 6th grade students will have keyboarding instruction for nine weeks during the school year. Mrs. Mankin's 5th grade and Mrs. Prater's 6th grade classes will continue keyboarding lessons during the fourth nine weeks.

Keyboarding is as important as it was years ago, and is a skill that will be used throughout their lifetime. Many schools are re-introducing keyboarding in the lower elementary since achievement tests require students to be able to type extended or essay answers online. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice keyboarding correctly at home on a regular basis using any free keyboarding program.



From the Guidance Office:

Scholarship time is upon us again as is applying for schools. Parents of seniors it is always helpful to call the college or university's financial aid office with your questions. They have individual counselors trained to answer the most difficult of questions. Before any student can be awarded grants and scholarships, parents and students need to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is to be completed on line now and will save much time in correspondence. Again, once a student has chosen a school, guestions can be directed to that school's financial aid office regarding the FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA can be a very stressful process; please be patient with each other and the particular school's financial aid office. The website opened for completing the application on October 1, 2022.

Reminder to all college bound juniors to register for the ACT (American College Test). The ACT is the predominant entry test for college in the Midwest. ACT wants students to register on line at www.actstudent.org. I also can help juniors or seniors who are struggling paying the registration fees with some fee waivers. The fee waiver is only good once a year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me with all of the requirements for this help. All current juniors will take the ACT during the school day on March 14th at the Community Center in the Arcadia Park. This ACT will be free of charge and lunch will be provided after testing. Juniors will bring home more information as the date approaches.

The Community Foundation Scholarships were available on-line beginning December 1st. All seniors should have received a post card from the Community Foundation explaining the process. Please encourage your senior to take advantage of this opportunity. The site closed February 1st, 2023.

All results from the American Institute of Research (AIR tests or end of course tests) will be to the district by February 21st. I will meet with students who retested and explain the results. Spring testing will begin in April and run until May. Dates will be sent home and posted once finalized.

I met with students in grades 7-11 to begin the scheduling process at the end of January and beginning of February. During the meeting times, I will have the information regarding CCP (College Credit Plus). This program allows students to take courses at local universities without tuition expenses. More information on the CCP program is in the update. If you are interested in your student participating, the intent form must be returned to the High School Guidance Office by March 30th. There is also a slide show on the guidance page of the school website with more information regarding College Credit Plus. All students new to the program will have an individual meeting with me and their parents to discuss the program more in-depth.

Sophomores who applied to attend Millstream Career and Technical Center will hear back from Millstream by the end of February. Millstream is another pathway for students to earn diploma seals for graduation.

In July of 2019, House Bill 166 was passed which changed the graduation requirements for students entering 9th grade July 1st of 2019. Effective with the graduating class of 2023 (our current seniors) all students will be required to meet three criteria to earn a high school diploma.

- Criteria 1 will be earning 21.5 credits at Arcadia High School, which must consist of 4 English Credits, 4 Math Credits, 3 Science Credits, 3 Social Studies Credits, 1 Fine Arts Credit, 1/2 Health Credit, ½ PE credit, ½ Financial Literacy and 5 Elective Credits. This is unchanged from previous classes.
- Criteria 2 will be showing competency with receiving a competent score on Algebra I (9th grade) and English Language (10th grade) end of course tests. If a student struggles earning a passing score, there are three options which can replace the test scores. These options are: 1.) demonstrate two Career Focused Activities, 2.) enlist in the military, 3.) complete college coursework in English or Math.
- Criteria 3 will be showing readiness by earning 2 diploma seals during high school. There are 12 seals to earn, Ohio Means Jobs Readiness Seal, Industry-Recognized Credential Seal, College-Ready Seal, Military Enlistment Seal, Citizenship Seal, Science Seal, Honors Diploma Seal, Seal of Biliteracy, Technology Seal, Community Service Seal, Fine and Performing Arts Seal, and Student Engagement Seal. I have started meeting with the class of 2023 and 2024 to discuss the new requirements and distributed informational sheets to bring home.




AMERICAN GOVERNMENT - DAN ALTHAUS

Middle School Language Arts Spring 2023 ~ Mrs. Plesec

Seventh and Eighth Grade:

With the New Year of 2023, it is common to make resolutions or even goals, but this year, the Middle School students were asked to choose their personal word of the year. In determining the word, students considered what went well in 2022 and what they wished would have been different. They also selected the word to be a representation of themselves, to be kept in the forefront of their minds each day, and to guide their thoughts and actions. Students then found inspirational quotes to support their word and created their own slide designed to highlight the focus word and the inspirational quote. Printed slides were hung up to create a beautiful bulletin board display. Some of the guiding words selected this year were: laugh, positive, healing, bold, adventure, progress, patience, and determination. What will your one guiding word be for this new year of 2023?

Seventh Grade:

Seventh grade students have been exploring social issues and changes that have occurred throughout US history. We began by reading two different historical writings and an excerpt from a historical fiction novel of the New York Triangle Factory Fire in 1911, thus comparing and contrasting the different texts and how the information was presented. Students then explored various social issues and changes that have been made through the use of nonfiction narrative texts. Social issues have included women's suffrage, civil rights, farm worker rights and safety, equality, and fair treatment. We did take a break from historical topics for Valentine's Day and read about the history of sugar, which they all enjoyed.

Eighth Grade:

As the eighth grade students are well into their adolescent years, and are nearing the end of middle school and preparing for high school, we have been exploring what it means to "grow up" and to "be an adult". We read a variety of poems, including Robert



Frost's poem, "The Road Not Taken", all centering around the theme of growing up and the challenges and the good times it can bring. We analyzed poems from both the teenage and the parent perspective. Currently, we are reading argumentative essays, discussing the question of the line between adolescence and adulthood, from the New York Times column Room for Debate. In the next few weeks, we will move from the theme of growing up into the theme of hard work and the work opportunities that are available for teens as they continue on their journey to adulthood.

Power of the Pen ~ Carrie Plesec and Carly Seery

2022 and 2023 has so far been a return to the "normal." but for our returning writers this is now a "new" experience for them. While Power of the Pen, as an organization, provided ways to continue to write and compete on-line during the pandemic, we are now once again back to pre-pandemic competitions, which means our writers are in person writing against other creative teens from across Northwest Ohio.

While our team this year may be small in size, they are overflowing with creative talent rooted in a passion for the written word and the desire to share their stories. Representing our 7th grade team is Jenna Hockley and Lili Powell, and returning for a second year is 8th grader Carly Wilkinson and newcomer Lea Altvater.

On February 4, the team traveled to Tiffin Middle School to compete against 15 other schools from the Northwest Region. At the competition, our writers wrote in three, forty minute rounds where they were given a prompt and then had 40 minutes to write their story. The prompts proved to be fun, yet challenging and provided a good test for our creativity and storytelling ability.

Qualifying for the regional competition are Lili Powell who earned 10th place overall out of 60 7th grade writers, and Lea Altvater. Lili will be competing March 11, 2023 at the regional tournament at Lourdes University in Sylvania, Ohio.

Middle School Math ~ Mrs. Carly Seery

7ⁿ Grade Math

While we were hoping for some fluffy, white snow to enjoy outside, we were hard at work inside learning more mathematics! After learning, practicing, and practicing some more they have become very fluent with positive and negative numbers and operations. They also learned how to set up and solve one and two step equations and inegualities utilizing their skills to combine like terms and use inverse operations.

To ring in 2023, students completed a Geometry unit on angle relationships and conditions that make triangles. Currently they are working on a measurement unit, find the area of rectangles, parallelograms, triangles, and trapezoids. They just learned where PI comes from and how it is essential to circles and have learned how to calculate the circumference and area of circles.

Continuing their understanding of proportional relationships and building off of their ratio work at the beginning of the year, students will be working on a percentage unit next, covering taxes, tip, commission, discounts, mark-ups, amount of error, interest, which are all incorporated into real-life situations making the math relevant.

8. Grade Math

After learning about scientific notation and being able to perform the four basic operations with numbers written in scientific notation, 8th grade math students connected their knowledge of proportional relationships from 7^a grade to learn more about linear relationships whose y-intercept is not through the origin. Through this learning sequence, students explored the slope of lines through similar triangles and graphed many lines.

Continuing to solve equations from their 7th grade learning, they became even more fluent with using the distributive property and combining like-terms in order to solve equations. They also learned how to identify the types of solutions of linear equations and now are able to tell if an equation will have one solution, no solution, or infinitely many solutions based on analyzing the slopes and y-intercepts of the equations.

They then learned about the angle relationships that are formed from parallel lines being intersected from a transversal, and explored the interior angle sum of triangles along with how the exterior angles are related to the two remote interior angles.

Currently they are working on a unit on Functions, learning the fundamental concepts of what a function is. They have also spent time practicing with linear functions, identifying the rate of change, the initial value, and how those two pieces fit into an equation that models the relationship. Their last step in the unit is to analyze graphs of functions and match up the graph to a real-life situation describing it.

Coming up next, they will be working on Geometry concepts covering Transformations, the Pythagorean theorem, and measurement of three-dimensional solids.

B.T. (Barb Tidd) CARING CUPBOARD



Next, we will be studying the difference between mitosis and meiosis while watching the Amoeba Sisters.

This is a day we honor our students in grades 7-12 for all their hard work during the 2022-2023 school year. Having almost exhausted a nearly 30-week focus on styles of essay writing, and focusing on the various stages of the writing process, controversy will be the subject of focus in English 120: College Writing, our College Credit-Plus (CC+) class for upper classmen planning to attend college. Our CC+ students will find themselves embroiled in a set of writings revolving around several topics that many people

have differing opinions on; topics such as the regulation of free speech, how to handle juvenile offenders who commit violent crimes, and whether or not to provide monetary incentives for organ donation. Human cloning practices take center stage in May, as we work to complete a multi-faceted research project to round out the course and the academic year.

Biology

In Biology, students have recently learned the differences between mitosis and meiosis. Mitosis is how we develop cells in our body. Meiosis undergoes a similar process, but only occurs in reproductive cells. We are well into our unit on genetics. Genetics is the study of how genes and heredity impact not just the physical appearance of an animal, plant, etc. It also can determine our susceptibility to conditions such as cystic fibrosis or Huntington's Disease. Soon we'll be learning about the structure of our DNA and why it is important. The Biology State Test is May 4th, 2023.

Anatomy & Physiology

We have been racking our brains while studying how the nervous system works. What is the nervous system? It is the reason you can move, think, recall a memory and react to loud noises. Our students just finished dissecting a sheep brain to learn about the anatomy of the brain. You'd be surprised with the way our brain is similar to a sheep in terms of anatomy. (Yet so different). We also used our senses to study how we are able to use our eyes, nose, tongue and ears for sensing. After our unit on the nervous system, we will study the cardiovascular system (blood, heart and blood vessels)

Earth Science

In Earth Science, we are learning about our atmosphere. We are learning about weather patterns, comparing and contrasting climate and weather, the 5 layers of the atmosphere and learning about the consequences of our ozone layer getting thinner. After we are finished learning about our atmosphere, we are going to begin a large unit on weather. Students will track the weather on their phone or device and write about the trends of weather and climate over a period of one month.

Mrs. Johnson The students in Child Development have been

working with the 3rd-grade teachers to help gain firsthand experience working with young children. The students have been visiting the 3rd-grade classrooms once a week. The goal of these visits is to help the students gain a better understanding of the behavior of young children, communication style, skills, abilities, and how they interact with each oth-


er. The students in Child Development have been able to work in small groups (as pictured) which has been a great hands-on learning experience for them. We are all thankful Mrs. Moreheart and Miss Snyder have allowed us to have this opportunity.





Geometry Classes

Both Geometry classes have been working hard this semester on learning completely new topics to everyone. The first topic the students learned was Two-Column Proofs. The students used proofs to construct arguments to prove that mathematical statements were true. The second topic that students are currently learning is trigonometry which is the study of right triangles and the relationship between their side lengths. The students have been working hard to understand these topics. The next couple of topics that we will be covering are probability and transformations of figures. These four topics are helping the students prepare for their Geometry AIR test in May. If your child is in Geometry and does not have their own calculator, I highly suggest they get one. It can be any calculator as long as it has the trigonometric function on it.



All of the Algebra 2 classes are learning about the characteristics of polynomial functions. A polynomial function can be any combination of variables, exponents, and coefficients. The students are learning about end behavior, turning points, increasing and decreasing intervals, zeros, and multiplicity. They will use Desmos to graph the functions in order to help them understand the characteristics. The next topic that the students will cover is rational functions. Rational functions are functions that are fractions that have expressions in both the numerator and denominator.

This activity will lead to group debates and finally an argumentative essay on a topic of their choice which they will research, and write incorporating ethos, pathos, and logos. These essays will be written using MLA style.

During this guarter we will be reading several essays focusing on argument and persuasion. We will be reading works such as 12 Angry Men, and Fahrenheit 451. We will also get our togas ready as we read Julius Caesar and analyze the speeches within looking for elements of persuasion. We are continuing to expand our vocabulary with weekly vocabulary lists. The state's standardized tests will be here before we know it, so we are continuing to practice and hone the skills needed for that exam.
