Greetings Arcadia Redskins,



We are over halfway through another school year, closing out our winter activities and heading into spring.

We are gearing up our plans for summer projects as mentioned in the last update. In addition, we are trying to wrangle in long term plans for our HVAC. We are currently experiencing difficulties with our backup boiler which has been in service since 1990. It is our stance that we should always have a backup system, but now considering upgrades to our HVAC, adding a boiler again may not be the best solution.

As we navigate through the finances to maintain our current facilities and those we have published in earlier Updates, it is important to put things in perspective. We currently operate as the lowest taxed district in the county. The money that you all so graciously give allows us to operate as we currently do with little left over to do smaller maintenance and upgrade projects every year. If we are going to achieve our identified goals regarding facilities, it is going to take what we already have coming in to maintain our current operations and also some additional funds. Where these funds come from are yet to be seen.

Our administrators are busy conducting interviews for vacancies due to staff retirement and other openings. We are interviewing for MS Science, Vo Ag, a 4-6 Instructor, MS/ HS Principal, elementary administrative assistant and custodians. In addition, we are also looking to hire a licensed Gifted Intervention Specialist. There are several specific licenses which are difficult to find and this one fits that category.

2025-26 Arcadia Kindergarten Screening



Kindergarten screening for Arcadia Local School Kindergarfen! will take place on March 28, 2025. Appointments can be made starting March 5, 2025 at 419-894-6431, ext. 300. Student must live in the Arcadia

School District and be five years of age on or before August 1, 2025. Open enrolled students are screened in their home school district. Applications for Arcadia Local School open enrollment will be accepted March 3-31, 2025.

It will be necessary for parents to bring a copy of the child's birth certificate. immunization records, proof of residency and court custody papers (if applicable) to the screening. Registration information MUST be completed at https:// arcadia-oh.finalforms.com prior to the scheduled appointment. State requirements for immunization are: 5/DTaP: 4/Polio: 2/MMR (Measles, Rubella, Mumps), 3/Hepatitis B Vaccine, and 2/Varicella before entering kindergarten.

KENNEDY PRATT GIRLS' BASKETBALL 2018-2019



A 2019 graduate, Kennedy was an outstanding player on the basketball court for the Lady Redskins. During her high school career, Kennedy recorded 1,169 career points joining just 6 other girls basketball players to reach this milestone. Kennedy was an all-around solid player in the paint with rebounding, blocking shots, and a high scoring average. During both her junior and senior years, Kennedy was a BVC 1st team selection, 1st Team District 8 selection, and 1st Team selection for Northwest Ohio. She was then named to the All-Ohio Honorable Mention Team as a junior and a senior. Additionally, Kennedy received Academic All-Ohio honors and earned 4 varsity

basketball letters during her tenure. Kennedy was also part of the 2017-2018 girls' basketball team that went 20-4 and rated in the Top 10 of the final Ohio Division IV AP Poll. Kennedy continued her basketball career at Hillsdale College in Michigan, appearing in 22 games for the Lady Chargers as a true freshman. After graduating with a bachelor's degree in biochemistry, Kennedy enrolled at Ashland University where she is currently studying to be a Physician's Assistant.

SAMANTHA WATKINS GIRLS' TRACK & FIELD 2018-2019

A 2019 graduate and the most accomplished female thrower in Arcadia school history, Samantha made back-to-back State Track & Field Meet appearances as a junior and senior throwing shot put and discus. During her junior year, Samantha was the Regional Runner-Up in discus and finished 6th at state. Samantha reached the podium her senior year in both throwing events finishing 3rd in discus and 5th place in shot put. In 2019, Samantha was the BVC runner-up, district champion, and regional champion in discus, and BVC champion, district champion, and regional-runner up in shot-put. She broke both the shot put and discus school records multiple times. Both records still stand today: discus throw of 140'2", shot put throw of 40'7.25". Samantha reached the Century Club four times and received All-Ohio Academic honors. Her senior year, Samantha was selected to participate in the Midwest Meet of Champions, competing against the best senior throwers from Ohio, Indiana, and Michigan where she earned 7th place in discus. Samantha was also an accomplished athlete in volleyball and basketball, earning 12 varsity letters during her high school athletic career. She also competed at the USA Weightlifting Youth Nationals five times. Samantha continued her throwing career at Walsh University throwing discus, shot put, hammer, weight, and javelin for the Cavaliers. She placed many times at conference meets and also set the Freshman record in javelin. Samantha graduated with a degree in education and is currently the Intervention Specialist at Cedar Elementary in Canton City for grades K-3.

GALEN BRUCE WRESTLING 1965

A 1966 graduate of Arcadia, Galen was one of the earliest contributors to Arcadia's strong wrestling tradition. As a junior in the 138 pound weight class, he would finish his regular season with an impressive record of 12-0-1. He went on to wrestle his way as the Mohawk Invitational Champion, Sectional Champion, and placed 3rd at the Northwest Ohio district meet which earned him a spot to wrestle at the State Wrestling Championship in Columbus. At that time in the earliest era of the sport, there were no divisions in high school wrestling and he would compete against other wrestlers from Toledo, Cleveland and Cincinnati. Galen wrestled his way to 5th place making him the first Arcadian to place at the state level. Galen loved the sport of wrestling and was proud of his accomplishments during his time at Arcadia. All his life, the stories he told were about his wrestling days. His daughter, Thana Mellott, shared that Galen was a dedicated, strong, and determined person well into his adult life. One time, when he was back in Arcadia for a visit, he participated in an open "old timers" biddy tournament at the age of 53. Wrestling 20 year olds, he ended up placing 2nd. He often talked about how he could beat anybody in one-arm push-ups. Sadly, Galen passed away in 2011. We are honored to induct Galen into the Arcadia Athletic Hall of Fame posthumously and recognize his accomplishments and contributions to the sport of wrestling at Arcadia High School.

What's Happening in the Elementary Art Room?

Kindergarten has been diving into the world of shapes and lines! Using construction paper, they created three cute houses, adding all kinds of details like windows, doors, and even some snowy rooftops. Speaking of snow, they had a blast painting snowflakes onto their artwork! Next stop: Spring! Get ready for a colorful adventure as we explore the magic of color.

First Grade has been hanging out with penguins! These black-and-white beauties have come to life through shading, giving them depth and personality. Students are also designing colorful backgrounds for their penguins to waddle across. But that's not all — they're learning about texture too, adding fun details like hats, scarves, and gloves to their frosty friends!

Second Grade is all about patterns, printmaking, and creating self-portraits. They've been drawing their faces on construction paper in their unique skin tones and crafting wintery backgrounds. Then, it's time to get creative with foam printmaking to make hats and mittens! It's a perfect mix of self-expression and fun techniques.

What's the Big Deal about the 100th and 101st Day of School?

These are exciting days in the first-grade classrooms! Quite literally, the 100th day signifies the 100th day of class in the school year. The symbolic representation, however, is much greater than that. The 100th day marks a special opportunity to reflect upon and celebrate major milestones in students' academic achievement. Mathematically, it is the first time that we get out of the ones and tens since we started counting each school day.



Learning what numbers after 100 look like and the reasons why they look this

way are important concepts in first grade. Knowing that one hundred one is represented as 101 rather than 1001 is an important part of number sense understanding.

In a recent science experiment, second graders discovered where they would end up if they floated down the river. They developed a model of the earth's surface and used it to discover an important principle about how rivers work. In the activity, Paper Mountains, a spray bottle was used to make rain fall on the paper models of mountains to observe patterns of how water and river flows. It was a fun day!





3rd Grade ~

The second quarter was a busy quarter in 3rd grade ELA. We covered a lot of topics that will appear on the state test. Improving vocabulary and fluency was a big goal for the second quarter, and as a class, they have shown amazing improvement. In Social Studies we learned about goods and services and the differences between states, countries, and cities.

In the third quarter, we will continue to work on preparing for the state test. We will have a huge emphasis on learning to write an essay. We are all looking forward to our field trip to the Mazza Museum. Please continue to read at home and practice spelling and vocabulary.

4th Grade

Mr. Baker

The 4th grade class has continued to show success and growth in language arts and social studies this school year! This group has shown a strong work ethic that has allowed them to be successful both in and out of the classroom.

In language arts we have continued to move through the 4th grade standards. Students have read a multitude of genres including: expository texts, biographies, narrative nonfiction, realistic fiction, fantasy, and poetry. Within each genre, we focus on rereading and closely analyzing the text to develop a deeper understanding of what we are reading. Additionally, students have made great progress with their essay writing. At the 4th grade level, students are expected to write informational or opinion multi-paragraph essays. As we have progressed through the school year, students are now understanding the writing process and the overall essay format.


In social studies we have been working diligently within our "History" strand of standards. Our big focus of the 2nd quarter was the Ohio Native Americans. We break the Ohio Native Americans into two groups: Prehistoric and Historic. For each Prehistoric tribe we look at artifacts they left behind and determine what that tells us about the way they lived. For the Historic tribes we focus on who they had cooperation and conflict with that was living in the Ohio region at the same time. Next, we will focus on the colonists fighting for independence and their conflicts with the Native Americans in the Ohio region.

We will continue to push each student to make steady growth as we move through the second half of this school year. I look forward to continuing to work with this 4th grade class!

In fourth grade we just completed our division unit and will be beginning to work with fractions. Every week, students have 5 Simple Solutions lessons to complete in Math, LA, and Social Studies. Those are completed daily as bell ringer activities, then they are reviewed for constant spiral review. IXL lessons in L. Arts/Math, in addition to classwork.. While there is ample amount of class time given, students will need to consistently work on these assignments outside of class, if not finished. Additionally, monthly AR goals are given to students. Reading nightly for 20 minutes is an expectation.

So far, every student has met their Accelerated Reader goal since September. Congratulations on working hard Sixth Grade.

Language Arts this Winter:

- Students will continue to complete the process of writing an essay that will be informational as well as continue to work on argumentative writing.

- Students will continue to build their oral reading fluency and reading comprehension.
- Students continue to read articles using My On to understand nonfiction.
- Students are working on identifying test questions through a myriad of reading passages.

Social Studies this Winter



From the Guidance Office:

Scholarship time is upon us again as is applying for schools. Parents of seniors it is always helpful to call the college or university's financial aid office with your questions. They have individual counselors trained to answer the most difficult of questions. Before any student can be awarded grants and scholarships, parents and students need to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is to be completed on line now and will save much time in correspondence. Again, once a student has chosen a school, questions can be directed to that school's financial aid office regarding the FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA can be a very stressful process; please be patient with each other and the particular school's financial aid office. The website opened for completing the application on November 24, 2024, which is a change from the past date of October 1st



Reminder to all college bound juniors to register for the ACT (American College Test). The ACT is the predominant entry test for college in the Midwest. ACT wants students to register on line at www.actstudent.org. I also can help juniors or seniors who are struggling paying the registration fees with some fee waivers. The fee waiver is only good once a year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me with all of the requirements. The ACT will be given during the school day on March 11th at the Community Center in the Arcadia Park. This ACT will be free of charge and lunch will be provided after testing. Juniors who signed up to test will bring home more information as the date approaches.

The Community Foundation Scholarships were available on-line beginning December 1st. All seniors should have received a post card from the Community Foundation explaining the process. Please encourage your senior to take advantage of this opportunity. The deadline was February 5th, 2025.

Results from all of the American Institute of Research (AIR tests or end of course tests) will be to the district by February 17th. I will meet with students who retested and explain the results. Spring testing will begin in April and run until May. Dates will be sent home and posted once finalized.

I will meet with students in grades 7-11 to begin the scheduling process the middle of February to the middle of March in the social studies classes. During the meeting times, I will have the information regarding CCP (College Credit Plus). This program allows students to take courses at local universities without tuition expenses. More information on the CCP program is posted on the guidance page of the school website. If you are interested in your student participating, the intent form must be returned to the High School Guidance Office by April 1.

In July of 2019, House Bill 166 was passed which changed the graduation requirements for students entering 9th grade July 1st of 2019. Effective with the graduating class of all students will be required to meet three criteria to earn a high school diploma.

Criteria 1 will be earning 21.5 credits at Arcadia High School, which must consist of 4 English Credits, 4 Math Credits, 3 Science Credits, 3 Social Studies Credits, 1 Fine Arts Credit, ½ Health Credit, ½ PE credit, ½ Financial Literacy and 5 Elective Credits. This is unchanged from previous classes.

Criteria 2 will be showing competency with receiving a passing score on Algebra I (9th grade) and English Language (10th grade) end of course tests. If a student struggles earning a passing score, there are three options which can replace the test scores. These options are: 1.) demonstrate two Career Focused Activities, 2.) enlist in the military, 3.) complete college coursework in English or Math.


Criteria 3 will be showing readiness by earning 2 diploma seals during high school. There are 12 seals to earn, Ohio Means Jobs Readiness Seal, Industry-Recognized Credential Seal, College-Ready Seal, Military Enlistment Seal, Citizenship Seal, Science Seal, Honors Diploma Seal, Seal of Biliteracy, Technology Seal, Community Service Seal, Fine and Performing Arts Seal, and Student Engagement Seal.

Started in 1986, Power of the Pen is an interscholastic writing league of creative writing for students in grades seven and eight exclusively offered for Ohio students. For more than 25 years, Arcadia has been proud to be a part of the 300+ schools across the state as Power of the Pen "empowers young people to find and develop their own unique creative voice through participating in district, regional, and state writing tournaments". Team members learn writing skills along with building relationships with other writers that last a lifetime.

While our team this year may be small in size, they are overflowing with creative talent rooted in a passion for the written word and the desire to share their stories. Representing our team are eighth graders Lynadie Harold and Gabby Martinez. They have shown tremendous growth in their storytelling abilities and grasp of the written word. Not only can they tell a story, but they can capture and hold the attention of the reader while infusing their stories with emotion and feeling.

On February 8, the team traveled to Tiffin Middle School to compete against 15 other schools from the Northwest Region. At the competition, our writers wrote in three, forty minute rounds where they were given a prompt and then had 40 minutes to write their story. The prompts proved to be fun, yet challenging and provided a good test for our creativity and storytelling ability.

We are so proud of our team for openly sharing their writing and competing against so many different writers!

Middle School Math - Mrs. Carly Seery

7th Grade Math Even with the snow, ice, and extreme cold of winter, 7th grade students have been hard at work inside learning more mathematics! After learning, practicing, and practicing some more they have become very fluent with positive and negative numbers and operations. They have also learned how to set up and solve one and two step equations utilizing their skills to combine like terms, use the distributive property and inverse operations, and then they competed in equation solving relay races to put their knowledge to the test!

Starting before winter break and continuing into the new year, students were learning and practicing real-world math in their percentages unit, covering discounts, sale prices, tax, tip, commissions, Simple Interest, percent error, and percent change. They solved a variety of different problems covering all kinds of percent scenarios, and have become very good in their calculations! Currently they are in the middle of a Geometry unit on angle relationships and conditions that make triangles.

With Spring around the corner, they will continue their Geometry work and combine it with a measurement unit to find the area of rectangles, parallelograms, triangles, and trapezoids. They will also apply these concepts to circles and learn about PI and its relevance to anything circular.

8th Grade Math After learning about scientific notation and being able to perform the four basic operations with numbers written in scientific notation, 8th grade math students connected their knowledge of proportional relationships from 7th grade to learn more about linear relationships whose y-intercept is not through the origin. Through this learning sequence, students explored linear relationships and learned all about the slope of lines through similar triangles. They finished up their unit on linear relationships having a strong understanding of slope/rate of change and y-intercepts/initial values.

Continuing to solve equations from their 7th grade learning, they completed a unit on solving linear equations and became more fluent with using the distributive property, combining like-terms, and using inverse operations to solve equations. Currently they are working on a unit about the different solution types to linear equations; one solution, no solution, and infinitely many solutions, and will continue this by graphing systems of simultaneous linear equations.

Spring time will bring with it lots of Geometry and Functions where they will learn about the angle relationships that are formed from parallel lines being intersected from a transversal, and the interior angle sum of triangles along with how the exterior angles are related to the two remote interior angles. Along with angles, they will focus on transformations, the Pythagorean Theorem and volume!

Mrs. Plesec ~ Middle School Language Arts

Seventh Grade The new year brought reading folklore stories, including Greek myths, to the seventh grade students. They have also been working on grammar, learning the helping verb song, and the variety of conjunctions. Writing sentences with different structures and the correct punctuation is our current focus.

Students have also begun exploring and reading about disasters, social issues, and changes that have occurred throughout US history. One significant disaster, a fire, occurred in New York in 1911 at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory. According to one of the sources we read, "The Triangle Fire was New York's worst workplace disasters up to that time. Only the September 11, 2001, attacks on the World Trade Center took more lives". By examining the time period of 1911, students are able to discover changes that have occurred to safety laws, fire prevention, and the reforms made by many states that we are familiar with today. We read two different historical writings and an excerpt from a historical fiction novel thus comparing and contrasting the different texts and how the information was presented. Not only was the study of this historical event and time period interesting, but it also allowed us to practice compassion and understanding for those affected, thus applying our empathy to people and situations today as well.

Eighth Grade Eighth grade students began the new year with a goal of becoming more aware of the events in the community, state, and nation in which they live. We learned the sections of the newspaper and the parts of a news article while also reading and gaining new knowledge and information. We were especially excited for the January 21 edition of *The Courier* to see so many major events including coverage of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, Inauguration Day, and the Buckeyes winning the National Football Championship. We furthered our community awareness by researching social issues and advocacy groups in our area. Students worked together collaboratively to create slide show presentations highlighting a local nonprofit and by using persuasive techniques, convinced the class that our community is in need of support to and from these amazing groups.

As the eighth grade students are well into their adolescent years, nearing the end of middle school and preparing for high school, we will start exploring what it means to "grow up" and to "be an adult". We will read a variety of poems, including Robert Frost's poem, "The Road Not Taken", all centering around the theme of growing up, the challenges, and the good times it can bring. We will analyze poems from both the teenage and the parent perspective. We will also read argumentative essays, discussing the question of the line between adolescence and adulthood, from the *New York Times* column *Room for Debate*. In the next few weeks, we will move from the theme of growing up into the theme of hard work and the work opportunities that are available for teens as they continue on their journey to adulthood.

We will also look at texts exploring the driving age and the requirements presented by different states in the form of arguments/persuasion. Students will then research topics of their choice centered around the challenges and situations that teems face, thus turning their research into argumentative essays to persuade the rest of the class into supporting their beliefs.

Physical Education

The middle school and high school physical education classes have been extremely busy learning about badminton and pickleball! Students have learned about a variety of skills needed for each sport and have ran separate round robin and double elimination tournaments. As this semester progresses, students will learn about a variety of invasion games such as basketball, steal the pin, team handball, and floor hockey. Students will also learn one more net/well game which is volleyball. Lifetime fitness will be a driving force behind other activities we approach such as bowling, cornhole, and fitness testing.

Health

7th grade

The 7th grade Health class has started off second semester learning about a variety of topics. Some topics included health and wellness and understanding mental and emotional health. We've had the pleasure of having Laura Breece, a prevention educator from Family Resource Center in Findlay, come into class twice a month to discuss a variety of health topics with students as well. Some of the topics have been media and your health and managing stress. Next week, students will participate in a program from Open Arms for three days. Open Arms of Findlay provides this free program to students every year throughout Hancock County schools. During this program the students will learn about good character traits in relationships and what healthy relationships look like. This semester, students will also take part in the CARE program which the Women's Resource Center in Findlay provides to Hancock County school student's. We look forward to Mr. Jim Saltzman, our school security director, coming into Health class this semester to discuss the dangers of drug abuse and go over CPR/first aid. Also, State Trooper Jeff Huffman will be visiting Health classes to discuss dangers of drinking alcohol and getting behind the wheel of a car.

9th grade

The 9th grade Health class has started off second semester learning about a variety of topics. Open Arms of Findlay provides this free program to students every year throughout the Hancock County schools. During this program, students will learn about good character traits in relationships and what healthy relationships look like. This semester. students will also take part in the CARE program which the Women's Resource Center in Findlay provides to Hancock County school student's. We look forward to Mr. Jim Saltzman, our school security director, coming into Health class this semester to go over CPR first aid as well as discuss the dangers of drug abuse. Also, State Trooper Jeff Huffman will be visiting Health classes to discuss dangers of drinking alcohol and getting behind the wheel of a car.

AMERICAN HISTORY 8th GRADE

MR. ALTHAUS

The eighth - grade students for the past month have been learning about the Con stitution and the Amendments to our government. They have learned about the different powers that are given to each level of our government and cornerstone principles like judicial review, separation of powers, and checks and balances. The students have also learned about the qualifications to be in the House of Representatives, Senate, and the President along with their corresponding powers. They have completed multiple assignments to demonstrate their comprehension such as worksheets, mock scenarios where they have to explain what rights have been violated, web quests, and a computer simulation game where they got to utilize their knowledge and put it to real use. Not surprisingly, the students found the computer game the most enjoyable. This information is necessary for young people to start to build a foundational knowledge of our government and how the three branches work with each other. In addition, the Amendments illustrate how our government has adjusted and changed to correct errors that people feel need ed to be addressed. In conclusion, I encourage all of you to explore the web site icivics.org to gain more of an insight to the computer game that our eighth graders played one day. Biology—In Biology, students finished learning about different types of cells and the function of each organelle. Students have a good understanding of how enzymes impact your body. They have been exploring photosynthesis and cellular respiration in class. Students got to model cellular respiration in class and learned how science is related to breadmaking. After reviewing Mitosis in cells, students have been studying heredity. **The Biology State Test is May 1st, 2025**

Anatomy & Physiology—We have been racking our brains while studying how the nervous system works. What is the nervous system? It is the reason you can move, think, recall a memory and react to loud noises. Our students are learning about how the brain works and why you cannot live without it. You'd be surprised with the way our brain is similar to a sheep in terms of anatomy. (Yet so different). We also used our senses to study how we are able to use our eyes, nose, tongue and ears for sensing. After our unit on the nervous system, we will study the cardiovascular system (blood, heart and blood vessels).



Notes from Arcadia's Instrumental Music Programs and Mr. Brake:

Elementary

The elementary bands are progressing very well! Learning to be proficient over a wind instrument or percussion is a long process that requires many hours invested in practice. The 5th grade band continues to expand the vocabulary of notes and rhythms they can play as spring concerts begin to approach. The 6th grade band is implementing more elements of expression into their playing. Adding dynamics, articulations, and tone consistency contribute to an enhanced musical performance and the 6th grade band has made great strides in those areas. You will be able to see both groups perform at the Music In Our Schools Month Concert on March 20th at 7pm in the auditorium.

Middle School

The middle school band has been working on concert band music but is also starting to work on marching band and pep band music! Many of the current band members will be first-year marching band members in just a few short months and we are working in class to make sure that they are prepared for the experience! The marching band program offers students many opportunities to perform, travel, watch other bands, and create bonds and memories that will last a lifetime. High School

Looking toward other spring performances, the Spring Arts Festival Concert is on Sunday, May 15th.

Did you know that Arcadia has a modern band program? A few years ago, I approached the administration about starting a contemporary ensemble/modern band program for students in grades 9-12 and they fully supported the endeavor. The modern band class, called Music Lab, is a class that gives students the opportunity to learn to play electric guitar, keyboards/synthesizers, drum set, and other modern band instruments. Students learn basic proficiency on their instruments, entry level music theory, live audio production, and gain experience playing as part of a modern band. The class is in its third year and has been an absolute joy to teach. If you have a student interested in music but not sure where they should start, they should consider adding Music Lab to their 2025-26 schedule if they have the room.

English 12

The seniors have progressed to the Victorian Era in our literature curriculum. They are delving into Satire and exploring the works of some of the greatest Satirists in literature. Our journey through the Victorian period will include studying many distinguished authors and texts.

Additionally, seniors are enhancing their academic writing skills in APA style. Mastery of both MLA and APA styles is emphasized to ensure students are well-prepared for diverse academic and professional scenarios they may encounter after graduation.

English 10

The sophomores have recently completed their unit on Literary Devices. Currently, they are concentrating on Themes and Symbols. Each student is engaged with one of the following novels: *Tuesdays With Morrie*, *Fahrenheit 451*, *The Great Gatsby*, and *The House of the Scorpion*. They are analyzing these texts to understand how themes and symbols are interwoven.

Furthermore, the sophomores will commence a unit on the Art of Persuasion, which will culminate in group debates and a persuasive essay written in MLA style. Students are also continuing their EOC (End of Course) preparation to ensure readiness for the ELA II test scheduled for April.

Mr. Lawrence's Science Update

Physical Science

Students in physical science have been learning about atomic structure and models, ionic compounds, and have begun learning about covalent molecules. We learned about the discoveries that occurred in the late 1800's and early 1900's that paved the way to our understanding of atomic structure. Using this knowledge students can now distinguish the difference in the nuclei of different isotopes. Lastly students have learned about electrons in the atoms and how the outermost (valence) electrons influence the bonding behavior of the atom. They have been naming and writing formulas for simple binary ionic compounds. These concepts set the stage for understanding chemical reactions.

Earth Science

This past quarter has seen us shift our focus from rock and minerals to learning about the atmosphere and liquid water on the Earth. We learned about the hydrological cycles and how liquid water is a tremendous weathering and erosional agent on Earth. We have shifted our studies recently to studying the atmosphere and have now begun learning meteorology concepts. Students have been going outside with portable weather stations to measure daily atmospheric variables and creating a weather journal with the end goal of recognizing patterns that can be used to predict upcoming weather.

Physics

In the first quarter, physics students were studying the "how" of motion. This past quarter has focused on the "why" of motion. We have been learning about forces and the Newtonian Laws of Motion. We developed mathematical models for forces based on scientific data gathered in our lab that we have been applying to larger scale problems. Currently we are learning about net forces and acceleration including the effects of friction and how different surfaces have different coefficients of friction.

Chemistry

Students began the second quarter with investigations into the effects of gas temperature, volume, and number of particles and the effects they have on gas pressure. Students developed mathematical models for the relationships explored in the lab, solved problems, and finally demonstrated a real life example for the class showing the relationship. Towards the end of the quarter we shifted our focus into atomic theory and the development of atomic models. We have now began to learn about the impact of light and its dual nature on our understanding of the atom.

Mrs. Gephart

7th Grade - The seventh graders are currently learning about how the assassination of Julius Caesar led to the downfall of the Roman Republic and the beginning of the Roman Empire. They spent a couple of days looking through theories that historians have come up with and investigated which theory was the most compelling. As a class, they decided that Julius Caesar was killed because the Senators were threatened by Caesar's increase in power and support from the Roman citizens.

• 9th Grade - The Freshmen just finished their Progressive Era chapter, where they learned about how the corruption and greed of the time period caused many changes in society. Topics include Upton Sinclair's book The Jungle and how he exposed the unsanitary working conditions in Chicago's meat-packing industry, which led to the passing of the Pure Food and Drug Act and the Meat Inspection Act. The Freshmen also learned how building regulations such as sprinkler systems, working fire escapes, room capacity, etc., were enforced after the unfortunate Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire in 1911, where 146 women perished.

Sociology - My Sociology students are beginning the chapter on social norms in society. During this chapter, the students will have to break a social norm in public and report back reactions from bystanders and how they felt about breaking their social norm. This is usually a very interesting/funny project that most of my students have enjoyed in the past!

MIDDLE SCHOOL TECHNOLOGY Info Tech 8

The second semester started with a new group of 8th grade students in Information Technology 8. The class is currently brushing up on their keyboarding skills and have started digital citizenship lessons that pertain to how technology affects their brain and their relationships. Students have also learned about the importance of proofreading their work and using proofreaders' marks to use for correcting mistakes. This is always a challenging unit where the importance of correct spelling, punctuation, and capitalization is used.

As students get further into the nine weeks and semester, they will continue digital citizenship lessons, using Google Docs and Microsoft Word to set up various types of documents, Google Sheets and Microsoft Excel, using Boolean operators to help with more precise Internet searches, and learning how the computer work and networks function.

Mrs. Jordan's MS Science

7TH GRADE SCIENCE-ENERGY-It's Electric

The students have been busy creating energy circuits. Our kits contain a number of circuits which exhibit energy transformations. The students put the circuit together and describe the transformations after they have successfully made the circuit. The room has been great as we listen to our "sounds" of energy.

8TH GRADE SCIENCE-DNA, MITOSIS, AND MEIOSIS

Wow, we are busy make DNA strands from red licorice, gummy bears, and toothpicks. The students make their structure and then decide where the adenine and thymine to and cytosine and guanine go. After we constructed our model, we twisted it, so it resembles the DNA strands in the human body. We also used cookies to create models of prophase, metaphase, anaphase, and metaphase. The students did a great job learning!

High School Finance—Ms. Marquart

It's hard to believe that first semester classes are finished and second semester has started already! Finance students just finished a unit studying wants vs needs and decision-making. One of the projects was called "Lost at Sea" where students were given a list of 15 items and first had to decide on their own what was the most important, second most important, etc., based on wants, needs, and survival being lost at sea after their boat caught fire. The classes were divided into groups and had to make decisions on how they would survive on a life raft with their teammates using the same 15 listed items. They then had to rank the 15 items from most important to least important according to wants, needs, and survival. The final step was to compare their personal rankings and group rankings to the experts...the Coast Guard. Results for most groups ended up being where they were barely going to survive or did not survive based on the Coast Guard rankings of the 15 items.

The project was a learning experience and led students to great discussions on how the items could be used, such as how they were going to make a sail out of a plastic tarp and a fishing pole, use a mirror to reflect the sun for help, use rope, shark repellent, and army rations.

The classes are currently learning about budgeting and managing their money, SMART goals, and making wise spending decisions.







Middle and HS Art—Mr. Brown

Wow, I cannot believe we have reached the half point in the school year! I'm excited to share a snapshot into the projects we have been working on this semester. I am continually impressed by the way in which my students take their assignment and add a personal, creative vision. This collection of work is currently on display across from the High School art room. It includes a diverse set of mediums and grade levels. I change the case out frequently to make sure to showcase new works.

Also during this time of year, I am continuing to collect and organize student work for the upcoming Spring arts program in April. Additionally, the student's and I have been helping the Choir and Music Dept. to paint props for upcoming shows and performances. I think it's very rewarding for student's to contribute their talents to help give back to the school and community.

Freshman English

This academic year has posed quite a challenge for our freshmen as they adapt to the demands and responsibilities of high school-level coursework. During the third marking period, we will delve into a survey of William Shakespeare, culminating in an in-depth study of "Romeo & Juliet." This will serve as excellent preparation for the state testing coming up in the Spring of their sophomore. To conclude the year, we will engage in an intense exploration of Elie Wiesel's poignant Holocaust memoir, "Night."
