The start of the school has gone well during these challenging times. We are back to in person instruction every day for those families choosing to attend while still offering options for those families who want remote instruction. Decisions on the type of instruction offered are being based on local information and not county wide data. That means that the state/county health department color system will not control the type of instruction offered to Arcadia students. If Arcadia Schools needs to shift to a hybrid or totally remote instruction we will make that decision locally.

The parking lot and new gym entrance are basically finished and I want to thank everyone for their patience during the construction process. Landscaping, resetting the arboretum memorial pavers, fencing, and the fueling station still need to be finished. We will be using the new entrance for athletic events this winter.

Update from Grade 1

Bats and Spiders are the topics first graders are learning about these past few weeks. While some may think they are scary, we learned they have an important part to play in our world. First graders are learning to write sentences with detail, learning math facts and reading with fluency and expression.

While we are practicing all of the basic skills, we have been also been learning to use the chrome books at school and at home. Please return them each time they come home and have them charged ready to go.

Second Grade

The second-grade students were privileged to have local author, Lynn Nye, visit their classroom on October 13th and 14th. Lynn shared her book, <u>Kinsley's Snowflake</u> <u>Dance</u>, a picture book telling the story of her granddaughter's journey of being born





with a club foot to becoming a young, talented dancer. Beyond just reading the book to the students, Lynn shared how those with physical challenges can still follow their dreams and the process she went through to write a children's book.

The second-grade students are going to follow the steps she shared to write and publish a class book. (Note- Kinsley's Snowflake Dance was illustrated by a local artist- Jen Sowders.) Third graders started multiplication for the year! While learning about arrays, they constructed "Array Cities." They made buildings and their windows represented the array. On each building they wrote their multiplication sentence. They came out great!











4th Grade: Language Arts & Social Studies from Mr. Baker

Even after missing the last part of 3rd grade, this year's 4th graders have hit the ground running! In language arts we have been exploring different genres of stories. For example, we have been analyzing the different characteristics of expository texts and persuasive articles. Additionally, we have covered reading skills such as problem/solution, compare/contrast and main idea. Students have also already written a personal narrative and friendly letter!

In social studies we started the year out with Geography! Students have learned about US regions in the 1800s, environmental modifications, map skills, and natural resources. We will soon move into our History strand where we will learn about the native people of Ohio.

I cannot wait to see how much this class can grow academically this year!

Fourth grade started out in science learning about landforms, and was assigned to do research which included creating a 3D model of their landform. This year, each student located a specific landform around

5th Grade Math and Science

Although we have had an unusual start to the school year, our 5th graders are doing well. We are enjoying being in the classroom together five days a week and are accomplishing great things.

The 5th graders have been reviewing and mastering their multiplication facts. The students have also been learning about the importance of place value and knowing specific place values of the numbers they are working with. Most recently the students have been learning long division. They are finding that the use of graph paper helps them keep their numbers lined up when they multiply and divide. The students have been using some new online tools to help them with this, such as Xtra Math, Splash Learn and then one that they have been familiar with, Study Island. Throughout the coming year there will be other online tools added to help them.


Our 5th grade year in Science started out learning the Lab Safety Rules and from there they moved into studying our Solar System. The students have learned about the different planets, the sun, moon, asteroids and meteoroids. They recently worked on a research project where they learned many interesting facts about the planets, sun, and our moon.



Fifth Grade

From beginning the school year in a hybrid fashion to currently being in person five days a week, the fifth-grade students have made a smooth transition.

We have explored the genre of biography through reading about a famous person in the Who Was/Who Is book series. Students self-sleeted a biography and shared their findings and information



through a brown bag biography book report. The brown bag contained three items that symbolized the person and the unique aspects of their life. We learned about all kinds of people from Queen Elizabeth, Albert Einstein, Neil Armstrong, Amelia Earhart, to Steve Jobs and Michael Jackson. We are moving on to the I Survived Series and exploring the historical fiction genre.



We also explored the origin and traditions surrounding Halloween and Day of the Dead. We shared our information in an online bulletin board site. We will continue



looking at origins and traditions of Thanksgiving.





Elementary Keyboarding

Mrs. Pessell's and Mrs. Morehart's 3rd grade classes have started the school year with basic keyboard instruction, which is held during the first nine weeks. Both classes are working on correct finger placement on the home row, keeping arms, hands, and wrists off of the laptop and table, sitting up straight, and keeping their eyes on the text or monitor in order to break any bad habits all while working toward 15 wpm. This has proven to be quite challenging since students want to type "their way", but after several weeks of trying to break those bad habits, thanks to keyboard covers, the students are starting to understand the requirements. The third grade classes are starting to learn that keying correctly is becoming easier now that they have been practicing. Most students have worked their way through to the top row keys, and some are even as far as the bottom row keys!

All 3rd through 6th grade students will have keyboarding instruction for nine weeks during the school year. Fourth grade students will continue keyboarding lessons during the second nine weeks.

Many state and achievement tests require students to be able to type extended or essay answers online as well as using the mouse to drag and drop answers, so keyboarding and mouse skills is still as important as it was years ago. Schools that once dropped keyboarding are now implementing keyboarding classes back into the curriculum. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice these skills correctly at home on a regular basis using any free keyboarding program.

From the Guidance Office:

Hancock County Counselors are in the process of preparing for Senior Financial Aid Night. The purpose of the program is to help parents, juniors, and seniors understand the importance and impact of financial aid when considering post high school education. The representatives will speak on issues such as grants, scholarships, and loans. Most of the evening's information will be devoted to explaining and discussing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is a necessary form to be completed before a university or college will grant any federal monies to a student. Most universities and colleges require this application to be completed before any school scholarships can be awarded as well. The FAFSA applications are completed on-line (https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa) and parents may access the site beginning October 1st, 2020. Since the FAFSA is available now on line, parents will be able to utilize the IRS data retrieval tool because 2019 taxes are already complete. Locations for the financial aid nights may be varied as in person or virtual. Once a financial aid night is planned, the information will be posted on the school website.

Juniors and seniors want to keep college entry testing in mind. For entry into any four year college or university, students must take either the SAT or the ACT. I am often asked the difference between the two tests and which test to take. The fundamental difference between the tests is the ACT (American College Test) is an achievement test measuring what a student has accomplished while in high school. The SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) is an aptitude test measuring reasoning and verbal abilities. Ohio is an ACT driven state as most of the private and public colleges and universities accept the scores. In reality, the Midwest (Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania) predominately use the ACT. Ohio, Michigan and Illinois use the ACT as one of their state test and test all juniors. The SAT is typically required for our Nation's most elite colleges and universities, such as the lvy League schools.

Students interested in taking the ACT can register on-line at www.actstudent.org ACT registration is on-line as student may see their scores sooner without a charge.

If a student is interested in the SAT, they can register on-line at www.collegeboard.com

The following colleges and universities have planned a virtual visit to Arcadia: Bowling Green State University Oct. 7th at 10:30 AM, Heidelbery Oct. 14th at 10:00 AM, The Ohio State University Oct. 14th at 11:00 AM, University of Findlay Oct. 21st at 10:30 AM, Bluffton University Oct. 22nd at 10:30 AM and the University of Toledo Oct. 29th at 10:30 AM. This is a great opportunity for juniors and seniors to ask question in regards to what the schools offer, admission requirements, housing and meal plans and campus visits.

College Credit Plus which replaced Post-Secondary Options Programs is available for any students currently in grades 6-11 for the next school year. If you have a student who wishes to participate in this program, please contact the Guidance Office to receive additional information. Arcadia Schools will have information explaining the program in more detail posted on the website in November. More information will be in the January High/Middle School Newsletter and distributed to students during the scheduling process. Currently Mrs. Conner Barr and Mr. Aaron Ebersole are teaching courses at Arcadia during the school day.

The Third grade took the Fall AIR (American Institute of Research) test on October 20th. Results will be to the District around Christmas Break.

Miss Burke's English Language Arts Update *ELA 7*


While the school year started out of the ordinary, students adjusted well, and we made the hybrid schedule work. I'm also appreciative of the respectful and responsible students who are making the best of wearing masks and following the COVID procedures and protocols we now have in place. Keep that up! We have been in school about 8 weeks, but we have already accomplished a lot. First, we started out the year



reading the novel, Freak the Mighty by Rodman Philbrick and ended the unit discussing theme and completing a choice board project. We are now reading each week nonfiction and fiction stories from Scholastic and completing both in-class comprehension pieces and independent practice. With regards to writing, students have been reviewing and working on mastery in the area of simple sentences and learning the MARK strategy. After this is finished, we will move onto writing paragraphs using the paragraph strategy, SCRIBE.

ELA 8

Just as I noted with 7th grade, I am appreciative of the students who continue to practice good



COVID protocols and requirements. To start off, we have finished up our unit on The Freedom Writers Diary by completing a historical topic choice board project in order to demonstrate understanding of relevant events as it related to the story and class discussions. Hopefully the students made good connections with the stories the Freedom Writers shared and expanded their knowledge of the world outside of Arcadia. We will be moving on

to reading fiction and nonfictions short pieces related to tolerance and change. Concerning writing, we have been working on sentence variety in our paragraphs by reviewing compound sentences. We also have been choosing between 2 paragraph options about every other week to demonstrate our writing capabilities. Next up for them is they will be choosing an argumentative topic to write an argumentative essay, which they then will be presenting and "persuading" the class as a final assessment of their argumentative skills.

This year has definitely been a learning experience for all teachers, students, parents, and community members! Thank you to all parents and guardians for helping us teachers during this time and for helping make the first nine weeks successful!

This year my students have definitely made friends with technology. Most, if not all, of my assignments and class activities have been on google classroom. In 7th grade, my students are currently learning about how Greek mythology has influenced Ancient Greek culture and society. They just finished their Greek gods/goddesses poster project and did a very nice job! In my American History class, we just finished Reconstruction which covers social, political, and economic troubles following the end of the Civil War. Lastly, in Psychology, we are currently learning about Sensation and Perception. In this chapter we are discussing how our senses help us perceive the world around us. Prior to this, the students created a brain hat and labeled how each part of the brain affects human personality and behavior. This was a very fun hands-on activity for the students.

I am looking forward to continuing the success at school during these crazy times!

8TH GRADE SCIENCE-It's History

We have been busy learning about the Earth's past by examining fossils and how they were preserved: imprints, carbonaceous, mold, cast, and



permineralized. It has been fun looking at the history of the Earth. They can't wait to go to Washington

DC to see some of the replicas of the plants and animals that once covered the Earth. They are now looking at the Law of Superposition and trying to decide how folded mountains, intrusions, and faults were formed and the order in which they formed.



Middle School Technology

Business Foundations 7

The first group of 7th graders in the rotation is just completing this nine week course. So far, the students have been continuing their keyboarding skills from elementary school and received weekly lessons on digital citizenship such as the good and bad of social media, balancing social media, how social media affects relationships, cyber bullying, digital footprints, how companies collect and use data from online activity as well as how apps are intentionally created to form an addictive behavior. All information posted online can be retrieved by future employers and college recruitment offices.

Mr. Saltzman, Arcadia's Safety and Security Directory, spoke to the students on the importance of being safe while online and reminded students that anything that is posted online is actually there forever, even after it is deleted from the device.

Information Technology 8

The school year started with two fresh groups of 8th grade students in Information Technology 8. Classes are brushing up on their keyboarding skills, looking over different types of documents using proofreader's marks to edit, and setting up the documents correctly in Google Docs and Microsoft Word after the corrections have been made.

As students get further into the nine weeks and semester, they will be learning about Boolean operators, setting up various types of documents using more features of Google Docs and Microsoft Word, digital citizenship, and how the computer works.

7TH Grade Science – It's a Circle or a Cycle?

The students in 7th grade are learning about all of the cycles in nature. They know the water, carbon, and oxygen cycle. We have been watching videos, looking at the weather, and analyzing data to determine patterns in nature. The words biotic and abiotic are being discussed as we determine different parts of these cycles in nature. They have been doing a wonderful job on this chapter. Keep up the good work 7th graders.

Page 10 Seventh Grade Mathematics Mrs. Carly Seery

Building off of the introductory ratio work completed last year, students have been working on a ratio unit, where they have been exploring and working with part-to-whole ratios including fractions, decimals, and percentages and part-to-part ratios including rates and unit rates. They have also spent time working with complex fractions where they have learned and applied strategies to solve problems with them. They will be applying their ratio and graphing knowledge further this year when we work on proportional relationships.

Currently they are working on expanding their understanding of the number system to include both positive and negative numbers including both integers and all rational numbers. They have become really good at adding and subtracting and now have multiplying and dividing to learn. Through the math topics covered so far this year, students have been posed with real-life situations and problems to help them encounter mathematics and how it applies to life, and up next in their mathematical work they will be working with percentages and equivalent expressions.

Eighth Grade Mathematics Mrs. Carly Seery

Since the beginning of the year, students in 8th grade math have been exploring the number system even further. Building on their knowledge of rational numbers from last year, they have now learned more numbers in the real number system including irrational numbers. To develop this further they have learned square roots of perfect and non-perfect squares along with cube roots and cube roots of non-perfect cubes and are able to calculate a square root of a non-perfect square by hand out to the tenthousandths place with accuracy.

Continuing to develop their algebraic skills of analyzing patterns of change, students were put into smalls groups and given the task to see how many times they could fold a piece of paper in half. Each group folded a piece of computer paper, a piece of long cash register paper, a small three by three inch square, a piece of newspaper, a huge five foot by three foot sheet of paper, and a sheet of wax paper. As they folded, they became good at forming a strategy to maximize the number of folds, but an interesting pattern kept appearing as we gathered and organized the data. The total number of folds from all groups ranged from six to eleven folds. From this experiment we watched the Myth Busters episode on the "seven fold myth with folding paper" and learned about exponential patterns and why a number raised to the zero power is always 1! Building upon this, we explored other properties of exponents.

Up next for eighth grade is an exploration in scientific notation!

Physical Education

The high school and middle school Physical Education classes have started this semester participating in Badminton and Pickleball. We played double elimination tournaments in each activity and had several great games with some undefeated teams. The students not only learned rules of the games but some strategies as well.

Throughout the remaining semester, students will be participating in archery, whiffleball, basketball, floor hockey, fitness testing, team handball, and spend a week in the weight room.

Mr. Flugga's Class Update October 2020

English 10

This year we began by exploring the various fields of literature. We briefly examined the different genres of literature. We have focused on the different stages of plot and how the setting itself can create conflict and act as a character. We have read many short stories including: *Harrison Bergeron, Searching for Summer, To Build a Fire,* and *The Race to Save Apollo 13.* As we have read the various stories we analyzed how the different elements contributed to the advancement of the plot. We have now begun the second unit which focuses on "Character Development." We are currently reading the Joseph Kesselring masterpiece, *Arsenic and Old Lace.*

The preparation for the End Of Course (EOC) exams has already commenced. Every week the students have a specific topic/skill/focus that is covered and practiced. We are also improving our vocabulary constantly with weekly vocab words in which we research to determine definition, part of speech and proper use.

The students have begun their first research project. The students have been introduced to MLA Style and they have been practicing citing various types of sources.

English 12

The Senior English students have begun a journey through the evolution of the English language as well a chronological tour of British Literature. We have learned how the English language has changed through different historical events. We have read some of the earliest pieces of British literature such as *Beowulf*, and *The Iliad*. We have journeyed with Geoffrey Chaucer and *The Canterbury Tales* and branched out into medieval literature such as *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight* and *Le Morte d' Arthur*.

The students have also been honing their research skills. They have been they have been learning how to become "qualitative researchers" and active readers. Throughout the year the Seniors will view several videos that teach various life skills. They will watch the video and write a critique and evaluation of the video. Thus far, they have learned how to establish good credit and how to give a good job interview.

Yearbook

This year's YB staff is small, but very eager and excited to create an amazing 2021 Yearbook. The staff has been working on their communication skills as they make telephone calls and write letters to local businesses to sell ad space in this year's edition. They have also been excited to stand behind the camera and take pictures that will be used to make this year's yearbook incredible.

High School Business and Computers

Google Apps/Microsoft Office

High school students are currently learning and working through different Google Apps. So far, students have gotten through Google Docs, Sheets, Slides, and have just started Forms. Other Google Apps covered in this course are Drawings and Sites before moving on to Microsoft Word and Excel before the end of the semester in January.

Financial Literacy

Google Apps for Financial Literacy is a new required semester course for sophomores this year. Students in this course have learned about the history of money, budgeting and managing their money, setting goals, spending and making wise decisions, and learning about their earning potential. The class will be learning the do's and don'ts of completing a job application.

Future topics for the next several weeks will include understanding your paycheck, reading a paystub, payroll, deductions, taxes, and saving and investing.

Introduction to Business

High school students in this year-long Introduction to Business course have been studying wants vs. needs, the decision-making process, competition, scarcity, factors of production, supply & demand, different types of economies, GDP, national debt, inflation vs. deflation, the major economic shifts in U.S. history, the standard of living, unemployment, and the four stage of the business cycle. In the current chapter, students have been learning about ethics and business ethics, sweatshops, conflict of interest, and business and social responsibility. Each member of the class is researching a different company who has had unethical business practices. Students have to explain what the unethical practice is, how they were caught, what happened to the company, and if they are still in business or were forced to close.

Future topics for the next month will include entrepreneurship, sole proprietorships/partnerships/corporations, franchises, co-ops, non-profit businesses, and the role of government in business.




High School Art

Mlr. Ebersole's English Update

Normally, I would be writing here to update our community on how the new freshmen are adjusting to the new high school environment or commenting on the research projects the junior class are currently wresting with. However, 2020 has not been "normal". Masks, distancing, online instruction, quarantines – these have become the norm.

To the credit of the students, the faculty & staff, school administrators, parents, and the community, things have gone about as well as anyone could have hoped for, in my humble opinion, as there have been a variety of hurdles to overcome and situations to navigate on an almost daily basis. Now that classes have resumed in person five days a week, albeit with a plethora of new safeguards in place, a sense of routine has been to some degree restored. That routine has been a positive for all involved, but especially for our younger students. I would be remiss if I didn't offer up a sincere "Thank You!" to everyone for their doing their part during this troublesome time to keep things trending in a positive direction.

As an educator, the challenges have been many, from switching instruction to an almost entirely electronic platform and fully embracing the technology completely, to keeping tabs on student progress over a variety of mediums. I still like paper & pencil best, for the record! However, I suspect that I may just be showing my age here. In the end, as with every difficult situation that must be navigated, our community as a whole will be stronger and better prepared to handle future issues because of our steadfast dedication in handling the current situation.

Having said all of that, here's a brief update on what is happening in...

Freshman English

An introductory poetry unit is in the books for the freshmen & and a survey of fiction and elements of short stories is well under way, wrapping up our first marking period. Mythology and Homer's epic, *The Odyssey*, loom on the horizon. The mythology unit will culminate with a viewing of the motion picture *O Brother*, *Where Art Thou?* and a lengthy comparison & contrast essay.

Junior English

Junior English students kicked off the year by composing a working resume, creating correspondences thanking potential employers for the opportunity to interview with them, and penning job acceptance and denial letters in both the general and college prep classes. We next focused on deciphering complex texts in order to identify the important information therein. Fewer texts offer the sort of challenges to student comprehension than those of early American literature. We focused our attention on colonial writings and culminated our examination with group research projects and presentations on the Salem witch trials of the late seventeen-hundreds. This research will segue into a reading and subsequent examination of Arthur Miller's classic play, *The Crucible*.

CC+ Composition

To date, our students have been introduced to a variety of essay writing formats (including description, narration and exemplification as of this correspondence), exposed to numerous exemplar writings by well-respected writers, and taken advantage of a multi-faceted revision process that hinges on peer evaluations. We will continue throughout the year to produce original works that will be revised several times over in order to produce the highest quality pieces of writing possible in order to prepare for the rigors of a college education.
