Greetings Arcadia Elementary School Families,

It is hard to believe we have reached the end of the first quarter! As we begin the transition into the second quarter, we should reflect on the many positives that have happened already this school year.

Our students have been working extremely hard and have been given benchmark assessments K-6 and continue to be progress monitored by teachers and paraprofessionals. These assessments allow teachers the opportunity to target instruction based on individual student needs. They will be benchmark assessed again in January/February. Our 2nd grade students, along with 5th grade students, have taken the lowa/CogAt tests, which is how students are identified as gifted. 3rd grade just finished up their Fall State Testing a few short weeks ago. Parents, please remember any student that scores a 700 will not have to take the ELA test in the spring. Expect those results to come in around December 12th. We will share those results as we get them in.

Santa Shoppe will run December 18th & 19th this year. The PTA did a wonderful job, once again, hosting Donut's With Dad's. We were able to complete our Halloween Parade this year and it was so great to see all of the students and staff show so much pride and spirit for this day. Congratulations to Ms. Jenny and Ms. Harmon for winning the Facebook contest "Rhyme without Reason" and won a free lunch from Toasted Yolk! Thank you to all of the parents, grandparents and family members that showed up for the Halloween Parade, as well as those that participated in the facebook "voting"! Mr. Saltzman was able to get around to classrooms this year and discuss Halloween safety - specifically when trick or treating.

As we continue to move forward with PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports) in the building, with the help of Ms. Harmon, we have opened up our school dojo store. Students can choose to "cash" in their dojo points for items from the school store, their teachers classroom store or purchase a raffle ticket into the monthly drawing. The school store is open on Mondays for K-3 students and Fridays for 4-6 students. Their classroom stores are open on a day that fits into the teachers schedule. At the end of the month, we look at students that have purchased into the Shout Out Raffle, as well as students that have earned the most dojo points for the month in their class. We then put their name into a random raffle for a \$5 gift card and a Lego set. Our previous winners this year have been: September - Adalynn Lauwers and October -Guinevere Horn. Through the first quarter of the school year, we have given out over 18,000 dojo points to students. Please continue to help reinforcing our students to be Safe, Respectful and Responsible Redskins!



The students also used Google Slides with the base-ten blocks on them and manipulated the pieces to create 3 digit numbers by moving them into a Place Value Chart. The students also used an abstract version of the base-ten blocks, using M&M's for ones, Pretzel Sticks for tens, and Cheez-It Crackers for their hundreds. 'With each tool, the students had to show the number in a variety of ways and trade in for the next place value piece once they reached 10 in any of the place value houses of the Place Value Chart. The students then practiced writing the 3 digit numbers in a variety of forms; standard form, picture form, word form, and expanded form. For a culminating activity, the students created Crankensteins adding pieces as they solved place value problems.

On October 27, 2022, the 2nd grade students had the opportunity to visit the Mazza Museum on the University of Findlay cam-

pus. The Mazza Museum is the world's largest collection of original artwork by children's book illustrators. While at the museum, the students worked in small groups "traveling" through the six galleries of the museum with the volunteer docents. Each gallery showcased a unique feature about the illustrators or focuses on a specific type of artwork found in children's literature. The students especially loved the paper engineering (Pop-up illustrations), as well as the Gallery of Hands. The students listened to and participated in a dramatic reading of a book and found the illustrations from the particular book in the museum. The 2nd grade students had the opportunity to become illustrators themselves, as they used the Patina technique to draw, color, and stain a picture of a pumpkin. Visiting the museum was a fun experience; with many students saying they are anxious to return with their families. Thank you to the Mazza Museum for the invitation!








Fourth graders are on a roll this year and working hard. We have finished multiplying big numbers such as 4 x 4,871 and 28 x 56. They learned a strategy that helps them get the correct answer, using an area model. The strategy looks like this:

In Science, students built their landforms and presented them to the class. We are discussing how weathering and erosion are responsible for most of the earth's landforms.

We are off to a great start in **4th grade!** The students have been working hard in language arts and have already developed a multitude of reading and writing skills. For example, students have already learned the text structures of sequence of events, compare and contrast, cause and effect, and problem and solution. Our writing skills have mainly focused on informational essays so far. Students have been working on developing the appropriate structure of body paragraphs in these essays. Soon we will introduce opinion essays, too. Finally, we have been focusing on enriching student vocabulary through utilizing context clues within the text.

In 4th grade social studies we have already moved through our Geography strand. Students have learned about map skills, different regions of the US in the 1800s, and different modes of transportation throughout history. Now, we have started to focus on different Native American tribes that lived within the Ohio area. We focus on the similarities and differences between these tribes. Furthermore, we will analyze the cooperation and conflict between the Native Americans and settlers. Once we have finished studying all of the Ohio tribes, students will pick one of the tribes to complete a shoebox diorama project.

I am looking forward to watching this group continue to grow as we move throughout the 2023-2024 school year!

5th Grade Math and Science

The 5th graders have been working through their Earth and Space Unit. They have been learning a lot about the planets in our Solar System and their characteristics. The students have also been learning about the Sun and the earth's moon. The classes created a colony, either in the form of a model or a poster, on another planet for humans to live on. They had to figure out what would be needed in order to survive for a long period of time on another planet. The students also had to write a report about their colony including how they would get there, the materials they would need to build their colony and who all would be the first people and animals to live on their colony and why. To make their project even more challenging, at the beginning of the year the students had to pick an animal, the animal couldn't be a cat or dog and it couldn't be extinct. The students had to make a plan to have that animal live and survive in their colony. (The students will also use this animal for other things in science throughout the school year.

The 5th graders have been learning long division and have recently started learning about decimals, how to add, subtract, multiply and divide them as well as comparing decimals. While the students have learned about decimals in previous years, this year the students are increasing their knowledge of decimals and how to use them to solve every day problems.

Skatetime

Students in grade first through eighth have been roller skating for the past few weeks. Students have learned how to stop properly, turn, and some have even moved on to skating backwards! Language Arts:

In September, students read from Scholastic Scope, this is a magazine that features current events and engaging articles for the students to practice a variety of standards. Also, students have read various pieces of fiction and continue to work on mastery of characterization. Plus, students are reading their first novel, Island of the Blue Dolphins of the year. Our fall is flying by!

The first month of math was a review from fifth grade. Students have completed units on decimal operations and fractions. Sixth grade math is now starting on new concepts involving integers, the coordinate play, and absolute value. Next chapter will focus on ratios which constitutes one of the most essential skills in sixth grade math.

Sixth grade students have been practicing science safety, the scientific method, and questioning. We are wrapping up our first unit dealing with rock and minerals, and are now moving into the topic of soil. We will also be incorporating our new technology which allows students to do science labs online. This will be beneficial for students to be able to participate in these virtual labs at their own pace as there is not always time or space to conduct them in the classroom.

Fun in the Fall:

40 Sixth graders attended Camp Nuhop in Perrysville, Ohio. While at camp, students participated in a variety of hands-on Science and Social Studies content area activities. Students also were engaged during a multitude of teamwork activities. During a hands-on Science and Social Studies activity, students participated in a Survival lesson, which challenged the students to create shelter outdoors. This correlated with their novel in LA because our main character has to build her own fire and shelter on a desolate island.

During their half day hike, students were enriched with exploring tree life, finding edible plants, and learning about how ecosystems are connected.

A favorite of the sixth grade was the high ropes course. In this challenge by choice activity students were strapped into a harness and completed a ropes course complete with a zip line down. As teachers, it is quite rewarding watching the children encourage each other and support one another as they face their fears. This was the most encouraging group to be brought to camp. Thank you, sixth graders!

The students were also having fun when they worked together on the giant swing, night hike, and campfire activities. We even tried canoeing this year and it was a big hit. Even us teachers were able to join in on the fun. Overall, the students had a great time while being actively engaged in the learning process with hands-on activities!

Hello and Happy Fall! The school year has gotten off to such a great start for me and all the students in my classes. It's been busy and productive throughout all of the classes. The first section of 7th grade Home Economics has already commenced and I'm hoping they are putting the skills learned in class to practice at home.

Global Foods was introduced this year and has been an exciting addition. We have enjoyed tasting days and lab days while venturing our studies into Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Scotland, Ireland, and England. While in these countries we study their culture, holidays, history, agricultural system, school system, and weather. We have many, many more countries to study and we're all excited to do so!

Elementary Keyboarding Ms. Marquart, Computer/Keyboard

Student in Miss Snyder's and Mrs. Morehart's 3rd grade classes started the school year with basic keyboard instruction. Both classes worked on correct home row finger placement, keeping arms, hands, and wrists off of the laptop and table, sitting up straight, and keeping their eyes on the monitor while working toward their 15 wpm goal. This proved to be quite challenging since students were trying to break habits they had developed in the past. After several weeks of consistent practice and using keyboard covers, the students tremendously excelled by the end of the first 9 weeks. The 3rd grade classes learned that keying correctly became easier after practicing. Most students worked their way through the home row keys and even to the top row keys in the keyboarding program.

All 3rd through 6th grade students will have keyboarding instruction for nine weeks during the school year. Many state and achievement tests require students to be able to type extended or essay answers online as well as using the mouse to drag and drop answers, so keyboarding and mouse skills is still as important as it was years ago. Schools that once dropped keyboarding are implementing keyboarding classes back into the curriculum. If you have a child in Grades 3-6, please encourage him or her to practice these skills correctly at home on a regular basis using any free keyboarding program.

National FFA Convention



Seventh Grade

What a wonderful start to the school year as seventh grade students worked their way through the transitions from elementary school to middle school. We began the year reading a short story titled "What's the Worst That Could Happen?", by Bruce Coville, which followed a young adult protagonist through the trials of school, best friends, and a secret crush. Relating was easy for the students, and gaining insight into the life of a middle school student, along with a few laughs, was a great way to begin the year.

We also read the classic tale, "The Headless Horseman", by Washington Irving. We analyzed the characters of Ichabod Crane and Brom Van Brunt for their personal motivations and their unique personalities, learning more about the characters and why this story is still captivating audiences today.

Seventh grade students were also part of the author visit from Michelle Houts, who spent the day with the elementary students. In preparation for her visit, we read three of her higher level picture books and analyzed them for imagery. She is an amazing storyteller and has a unique ability to create the image for the reader with her use of sensory details and figurative language. Students wrote their own descriptive pieces based off of a picture of scenery and then Ms. Houts gave a presentation on the revising and editing process. She gave us many tips that were put to use in the classroom the next day. She also shared her frustrations and celebrations as a writer, many of which the students could relate to. We really enjoyed her visit and being part of the festivities of the day.

Eighth Grade

What a great start to the school year the eighth graders have had. We began the year reading and analyzing the poem "Where I'm From" by George Ella Lyon. According to the website Poem Analysis, "In 'Where I'm From' Lyon delves into themes of identity, home, and history. By looking deeply into her own childhood, and pinpointing the things that make her unique, Lyon is able to lay out a roadmap to understanding herself. Since its publication 'Where I'm From' has been taught in classrooms around the world. It is often used as a template to inspire children and adults alike to think about their own lives and explore what makes them special. Variations of 'Where I'm From' can be found all over the internet by writers from innumerable backgrounds and cultures" (2023). After reading her poem and others, students wrote their own "Where I'm From" poems full of descriptions of love, family, community, and an appreciation for their childhood.

Currently, we are examining the literary genres of horror and mystery. We read a variety of short stories including "The Tell Tale Heart" by Edgar Allan Poe, and The Monkey's Paw by W.W. Jacobs. After identifying foreshadowing, irony, and elements of suspense, tension, and surprise, students tried out their own creativity in writing. Students wrote two sentence horror stories and suspenseful phrase poetry. An essay focusing on the elements of the mystery and horror genre will conclude this unit.

Middle School Mathematics

Mrs. Carly Seery

Seventh Grade

Starting the year, students spent time expanding their knowledge of the number system with positive and negative numbers. Within the unit, they learned how to add, subtract, multiply, and divide with positive and negative integers and rational numbers including fractions and decimals.

From here, they used their ratio work completed last year, in a unit on proportional relationships. In the unit, they learned how to identify the unit rate as the constant of proportionality and how it looks in a verbal situation, on a graph, in an equation, and in a mathematical table. They also spent time working with fractional unit rates where they have learned and applied strategies to solve problems with them.

Building off of their earlier work with signed numbers, students are currently working on using this knowledge in a unit on Expressions and Equations. They have learned all parts of an expression, and are working on simplifying expressions by combining like terms. They will continue to work with expressions by using the distributive property to expand expressions and to factor them. Next up they will be learning how to solve one and two step equations.

Through the math topics covered so far this year, students have been posed with real-life situations and problems to help them encounter mathematics and how it applies to life, and up next in their mathematical work they will be working with percentages and equivalent expressions.

Eighth Grade

Since the beginning of the year, students in 8th grade math have been exploring the number system even further. Building on their knowledge of rational numbers from last year, they have now learned more numbers in the real number system including irrational numbers. To develop this further they have learned square roots of perfect and non-perfect squares along with cube roots and cube roots of non-perfect cubes and are able to calculate a square root of a non-perfect square by hand out to the ten-thousandths place with accuracy.

Continuing to develop their algebraic skills of analyzing patterns of change, students were put into smalls groups and given the task to see how many times they could fold a piece of paper in half. Each group folded a piece of computer paper, a piece of long cash register paper, a small three by three inch square, a piece of newspaper, a huge five foot by three foot sheet of paper, and a sheet of wax paper. As they folded, they became good at forming a strategy to maximize the number of folds, but an interesting pattern kept appearing as we gathered and organized the data. The total number of folds from all groups ranged from six to eleven folds. From this experiment we watched the Myth Busters episode on the "seven fold myth with folding paper" and learned about exponential patterns and why a number raised to the zero power is always 1! Building upon this, we explored other properties of exponents and are currently working on a unit on scientific notation.


Up next for eighth grade is an exploration into linear relationships and solving linear equations!


7TH and 8th Grade Science-What a World!

The 8th grade Science students have been learning about plate tectonics, Alfred Wegener, lithosphere, asthenosphere, convergent boundaries, and divergent boundaries! This is a small portion of what we have been doing. We used Milky Way bars to represent the crust, mantle, and core. After we analyzed the candy, we then simulated a divergent boundary by pulling the two pieces of bar apart, next we pushed the bar together for a convergent boundary, finally, we split the bar in half for a transformed boundary-it was a delicious experience.



Seventh grade students are learning about cycles in the world. Specifically; the water, carbon, and nitrogen cycle. Did you know we cannot create new water nor destroy the water? All the water that is here today has been here for a long time. We need water, carbon and nitrogen so all living things can survive. They are doing a great job of learning the cycles. They worked on a computer program to see where all of the water is located in the world and how all of the cycles work together. Keep up the good work!







Middle School Technology / High School Business and Computers

Business Foundations 7

The first group of 7th graders in the rotation just completed their nine-week course. Students continued their keyboarding skills from elementary school and received several digital citizenship lessons such as balancing social media, how social media affects relationships, cyber bullying, digital footprints, and sexting. In October, Mr. Saltzman, Arcadia's Safety and Security Director, spoke to the students regarding the underage laws of sexting.

National Digital Citizenship Week was celebrated October 16-20. Ms. Marquart's 7th grade Business Foundations class worked on different lessons throughout the week. This year's theme was 'Healthy Young Minds' and included lessons to practice digital well-being in our lives. Activities were based on creating healthy digital media habits for ourselves, understanding "thinking traps" and how to avoid them, digital media and your brain, and how distracting device tricks can be used in positive ways.

Information Technology 8

The school year started with a fresh group of 8th grade students in Information Technology 8. Classes brushed up on their keyboarding skills, learned about and used Boolean operators to help with Internet searches, and used proofreader's marks for editing different types of documents. Once all corrections had been marked, students correctly set up the documents in both Google Docs and Microsoft Word. During the second half of the semester, the 8th graders will be working on various types of documents, reports, the correct format in writing an email, coding, and how the computer works.

Both Google Docs and Microsoft Word are used in 8th grade since students must be versatile in both programs with the business world still being a Microsoft majority.

Financial Literacy

Financial Literacy with Google Apps is a required course for sophomores, juniors, and seniors. Students have studied about the history of money, budgeting and managing their money with Google Sheets, setting/SMART goals, spending and making wise decisions, their earning potential, and completing a job application. Mrs. Angie Spridgeon, Arcadia's Treasurer, had a presentation explaining how school budgets work, what Arcadia's budget looks like, and how five-year forecasting is a state requirement for Ohio schools.

Most recently, the classes have completed several projects involving paychecks, how to calculate from gross to net pay, different types of payroll deductions, and how to fill out a Form W-4.

Future topics for the next several weeks will include, income taxes, credit, credit scores, debit vs credit cards, and checking accounts.

Introduction to Business

High school students enrolled in Introduction to Business have been busy learning about various topics in a unit called "Business in a Changing World." Within this unit are three sections. The first section was 'Business and Economics' that focused on supply and demand, competition, the economic cycle, and the importance of the American economy. The second section was 'Business Ethics and Social Responsibility'. Students were given case studies and videos to discuss and later decide if the situation what ethical or unethical, fair and honest, and how social responsibility came into play in the business. The third section, 'Business in a Borderless World,' entailed international business, trade between countries, exchange rates, balance of trade, and economic, ethical, legal, and political barriers.

Students are just beginning Unit 2 that is titled "Starting and Growing a Business." Two sections are included in this unit called 'Enter the World of Business' and 'Small Business, Entrepreneurship, and Franchising'. Students will learn about sole proprietorships, partnerships, corporations, joint ventures, S corporations, and limited liability companies as well as advantages and disadvantages of entrepreneurship.

Mr. Flugga's Class

English 10

This year we began by exploring the various fields of literature. We briefly examined the different genres of literature. We have focused on the different stages of the plot and how the setting itself can create conflict and act as a character. We have read many short stories including *Harrison Bergeron, Searching for Summer, To Build a Fire,* and *The Race to Save Apollo 13.* As we read the various stories we analyzed how the different elements contributed to the advancement of the plot. We have now begun the second unit which focuses on "Character Development." We have recently finished reading the Joseph Kesselring masterpiece, *Arsenic and Old Lace.*

The preparation for the End Of Course (EOC) exams has already commenced. Every week the students have a specific topic/skill/focus that is covered and practiced. We are also improving our vocabulary constantly with weekly vocab words which we research to determine definition, part of speech, and proper use.

The students will soon begin their first research project. The students will be introduced to MLA Style and they will use it to cite various types of sources.

English 12

The Senior English students have begun a journey through the evolution of the English language as well a chronological tour of British Literature. We have learned how the English language has changed through different historical events. We have read some of the earliest pieces of British literature such as *Beowulf*, and *The Iliad*. We have journeyed with Geoffrey Chaucer and *The Canterbury Tales* and branched out into medieval literature such as *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight* and *Le Morte d' Arthur*. The seniors have just begun reading Shakespeare's *Macbeth* and *Hamlet*.

The students have also been honing their research skills. They have been learning how to become "qualitative researchers" and active readers. Throughout the year the Seniors will view several videos that teach various life skills. They will watch the video and write a critique and evaluation of the video. Thus far, they have learned how to establish good credit and how to give a good job interview.

Yearbook

This year's YB staff is small, but very eager and excited to create an amazing 2024 Yearbook. The staff members are working on their communication skills as they write letters to local businesses to sell ad space in this year's edition. They have also been excited to stand behind the camera and take pictures that will be used to make this year's yearbook incredible. The theme for this year's annual is "A Record Year." It is a fun, rhetro design. If you haven't already placed an order be sure to do so before March 1 to receive your early bird price. The information can be found on the school's website. If you are interested in purchasing a previous year, please let me know and I can look into its availability.

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT

This past chapter the juniors in American Government have been examining the U.S. Constitution in depth and our basic principles. Those principles include federalism, judicial review, checks and balances, separation of powers, limited government, and popular sovereignty. These foundational pieces are the cornerstone of our republican system of government. The students also answered questions over the seven articles that outline this historic document and learned all of our twenty -seven Amendments that have been passed over the years.

The students also had to demonstrate their learning in a multitude of ways. They had to focus on some specific Supreme Court cases in groups which utilized the principle of judicial review. Students also had to answer some questions directly over the Constitution and the Amendments addressing key points including but not limited to the requirements and powers of the Congress, the full faith and credit clause, habeas corpus, original jurisdiction, extradition, eminent domain, and bail. The government students also played a computer review game testing their knowledge of the material.

I would also like to take a moment to congratulate our golf team which had a wonderful year and advanced to the District tournament in Bowling Green by finishing first in the Sectional tournament at Sycamore Springs. We did not advance to the State tournament but Brayton Hindall shot a 77 and missed a trip to State by a stroke. Way to go SKINS!

Biology—Mr. Adams

In Biology, we are continuing to learn about how organisms interact with one another in an ecosystem. Students learned how to create a food chain from a deck of cards with a variety of producers and consumers. Our sophomores also learned how energy flows in a food web, which, in simplest terms, is a cluster of food chains. After learning about how energy flows through an ecosystem, students learned about populations and communities. Students created a poster presentation on a biome (Ex: desert, rainforest) They found examples of living and nonliving things in that biome (like a desert or rainforest), described the climate of that area and looked up fun facts about their biome. As students prepare for the AIR test later in the year, they are involved in hands-on, and relevant activities/labs that challenge their thinking. We are wrapping up our discussion on the environment, and are going to discuss the structure and processes that occur in a cell. I am looking forward to teaching this motivated and energetic group of students more about the world they live in.

Anatomy & Physiology

We have certainly been busy in Anatomy and Physiology. We spent the first few weeks learning basic anatomy and physiology terminology. Anatomy is the study of body structure, physiology is the study of body function. We have eleven body systems which all play a key role in keeping us alive. We have wrapped up our skeletal system unit and are now moving onto the muscles. Students are comparing and contrasting the muscles in a cat vs a human. These students have especially been working hard all year, and I greatly appreciate their desire to learn more about the body they occupy.

Earth Science

Our Earth Science students have been learning about different types of maps, rocks and minerals. Earlier in the year, in order to learn about making topographic maps, we worked on a lab that taught students how to read and design their own topographic map, which informs us about detail in the land such as elevation. We also talked about different kinds of rocks and how minerals can be identified using various techniques. Students learned that weathering is the physical or chemical breakdown of the rock, while erosion is the actual traveling of that sediment. Students have been shown fossils from collection sets and are studying which time period they came from. After studying fossils, students are going to learn about the structure and function of volcanoes. They will build a volcano of their own in class!

Mr. Ebersole's English Update

Freshman English

Poetry & fiction units are in the books for the freshmen, wrapping up our first marking period. Mythology and Homer's epic, *The Odyssey*, loom on the horizon. The mythology unit will culminate with a viewing of the motion picture *O Brother, Where Art Thou?* and a lengthy comparison & contrast essay. Many students are familiar with this film, but they are unaware that it is actually a contemporary adaptation of Homer's epic narrative. Exercises, focused upon providing textual evidence to support one's assertions, as well as vocabulary identification and acquisition, will take us into the winter break and through the first semester of the academic year. Following this unit, an intensive study of William Shakespeare's *Romeo & Juliet* await!

Junior English

To kick off the school year, junior English students in both the general and college prep classes focused on composing a working resume, creating correspondences thanking potential employers for the opportunity to interview with them, and practiced penning job acceptance and denial letters in response to subsequent job offers. We next focused on deciphering complex texts in order to identify the important information therein. Fewer texts offer the sort of challenges to student comprehension than those of early American literature. We focused our attention on colonial writings and culminated our examination with group research projects and presentations on the Salem witch trials of the late seventeenth century. These projects segued into our current reading of Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* and a further examination of allegory and extended metaphors. The foundational literature of the Revolutionary War from authors of such historical significance as Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, and Thomas Paine will commence with our juniors after the holidays.

CC+ Composition

This academic year marks the seventh consecutive year that Arcadia's high school students have had the opportunity to earn college English credit through the high school during regularly scheduled class meeting times. The College Credit-Plus (CC+) composition course is a wonderful opportunity for college-minded students to gain exposure to post-secondary level texts, workloads, and, most important of all, expectations. This opportunity also allows savings on future expenses as well for those interested in attending college after graduation! Once again partnered with Franklin University, Arcadia offers a chance for students to earn three college credit hours by aligning our curriculum with the university's entry-level freshman writing course — English 120: College Writing. To date, our students have been introduced to a variety of essay writing formats, exposed to numerous exemplar writings by well-respected writers, and taken advantage of a multi-faceted revision process that hinges on peer evaluations. We will continue throughout the year to produce original works that will be revised several times over in order to produce the highest quality pieces of writing possible!
